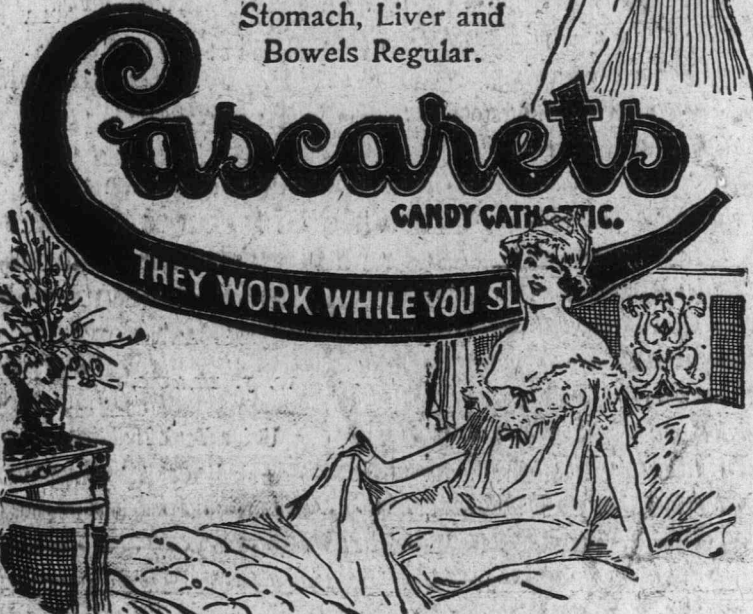

## NEW SHOES WON'T HURT AFTER THIS

Cincinnati man tells how to shrivel up corns so they lift out.

Ouch! ? ! ? ! BRIDGEBURG, June 17.—The five-year old daughter of William Murray of Fort Erie was thrown twenty feet into a bush, but was unhurt, when another auto driven by persons at present unknown, struck the Murray car on the Canadian Niagara boulevard near Black Creek a few miles from here late last night. Mrs. James Edwards, wife of Chief Edwards of the Ontario Police at Fort Erie, was in the car that was struck along with Mr. Murray and his wife and child.

The other car did not stop long enough to see if the child had been injured, but hastened on after the accident. The persons in it also refused to give their names. Mrs. Edwards, however, had presence of mind enough to take the license number of the speeding car and today Chief Edwards telegraphed to Toronto for the information regarding this car bearing that number.

It is said the colliding car was going at the rate of forty miles an hour at the time of the accident.

## MUST BE NICE ON BURLINGTON BEACH

HAMILTON, June 16.—Following the example of the authorities at Atlantic City, Old Orchard Beach and other fashionable watering places in regulating bathing costumes and the conduct of bathers, the Burlington Beach commission has decided to instruct the officers for the commission, George S. Kerr, to prepare a by-law which will make it unlawful for an unseemly display of legs and other parts of anatomy on the boulevard on the sand strip. Bare-legged and wet-armed bathers will no longer be able to mingle with the thronging crowd on the walks. The by-law will prohibit adults bathing on the bay shore, which will be reserved solely for children under 12 years of age accompanied by parent or guardian, and the grounds will be shoed to the lake waters for dipping purposes.
