The Maitland River is still rising at the rate of six inches an hour. The streets and cellars of Lower Wingham are flooded. Fisher & Hutton's milldam has been carried away. Farms along the river bank are covered with water, A terrible deluge of rain, accompanied by thunder and lightning, descended on and thousands of dollars worth of grain this town ruined. Mr. Smith's house, in this town, was struck with lightning yesterday morning and the house badly damaged. inches of the rails.

AT GODERICH the river wasgreatly swollen, but fortun ately not much damage was done. Attrill's flats were almost entirely submerged, and the river rose higher than during the spring freshets. The foot bridge across to Mr. Attrill's residence was carried away, and a couple of hay stacks on the flats were similarly dealt with by the flood. A large quantity of debris from up stream is constantly carri-ed down the Maitland to the lake.
