Find Frangments of Bones. From the wreck were recovered to day fragments of bones that are be-lieved to represent three bodies. The fragments were found in the mud and ubbish on the main deck underneath n inverted conning tower, which had been hurled sixty feet back from its original position, and close to the spot were the bones of a foot encased in shoe, and other fragments were ound several weeks ago.
The gruesome fragments consisted of a skull, the frontal part crushed in. everal pieces of jaw bones and por-

tions of vertebrae. Other splintered fragments were not identified.
The bones are discolored and coral osed of mahogany panels stripped rom the admiral's cabin. Soon Clear of Water.
