Cable News.

LONDON, June 15. Despatches from points of South Western Europe report several earthquakes. At Bucharest two shocks were felt, while several towns in Southern Hungary were also affected. No serious damage occurred.

NEW YORK, June 15. By a narrow margin of one quarter of one goal the American polo team won the second and deciding game of the international cup series, and retains the trophy for another year. An excited gathering of 30,000 spectators attended.

LONDON, June 15. The Court season is likely to be prolonged. King George is the busiest man in the Kingdom, and growing increasingly popular. Notably since his return from Berlin he has been received in every public appearance with the genuine plaudits of the populace. No King can work harder. For weeks past, and for at least five weeks to come, only three or four days have not yet been booked for some public appearance.

LONDON, June 15. Mrs. Pankhurst, whilst leaving her house to attend the Davison funeral, was re-arrested and taken to Holloway jail. Miss Davison was buried at St. George's Church, Bloomsbury. Some thousands of suffragettes followed the bier, and thousands of people followed the suffragettes. There was much display, and twenty bands. The rector of the Church issued a statement that he did not sympathize with militant tactics.

PARIS, June 15. A French force has been ambushed and seriously cut up by Moroccans. The column, under Col. Mangin, which had been operating in the Tabla region, about a hundred miles from Marrakish, was surprised by a large force of the enemy near Kalfia. Before it could extricate itself 84 were killed and 1,000 wounded. The General Concha, was fired upon by the natives. The gunboat Lania rescued 62 of the crew, including 13 wounded. Three men are missing, and nine have fallen into the hands of the Moors. The Commander of the vessel fell dead on the bridge shot through the eye.

LONDON, June 15. The intervention of the Czar of Russia in the Serbo-Bulgarian controversy, was so timely and authoritative that peace now seems to be practically assured. His offer to arbitrate could not have been declined by either party without stultification, and what is of more importance, without risking the loss of all that has been gained in the war with Turkey. An intimation that if pacific intervention were disregarded it would be followed by military measures, brought the Bulgarians to their senses, for they could expect no consideration from Russia if the Slav cause were imperilled by the arbitrament of battle.

LONDON, June 15. Floods in Palatka, India, on the Kathiawar peninsula, have cost 200 lives.

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How He Was Hurt.

The horse which knocked down Patrick Doran, on the South Side, Saturday, as reported in the Telegram, did not run away but was driven along at a rapid rate by two boys. The road is narrow here and the man who is very deaf was coming out of Mrs. Byrne's shop when the horse ran full tilt against him and he was thrown with much violence to the ground, one of the wheels going over his legs and breaking one just below the knee. He was brought into Mrs. Byrne's and Mr. John Kelly, of Bowring's where Doran is employed steadily, called Dr. Roberts who attended to him and he was then taken to the hospital in the ambulance. Boys should not be allowed to drive horses in a moral to be learned from this accident. Another feature is that of late the South Side road has become the scene of reckless and furious driving. Empty motor cars, crabs, and express and all sorts of vehicles pass here at break neck speed and how children and pedestrians have escaped to date is a mystery. To check this condition of affairs a policeman is badly needed on the South Side.

ICE IMPEDES FISHERY.—People who arrived from the northward yesterday's express, say that there is a good deal of ice still about Twillingate and neighborhood and icebergs are abnormally plentiful. When they break up which they frequently do near the shore, they are a menace to traps and nets and impede the fishery. Traps and liners are doing very little in this section and there is yet no sign of caplin. About Lewisporte they are doing very well with lobsters and herring are very plentiful and big hauls are being made.

SURVEYED THE SYDNEY SMITH.—Mr. Wm. Butler, diver, arrived here by the Bruce express yesterday from Twillingate where he had been two days, with the exception of short intervals, under the English schooner Sydney Smith, which he thoroughly surveyed. The vessel went ashore last fall in a gale grounding firmly on Harbor Rock with 4,000 gals. fish in the hold. She lays in about six fathoms of water and Mr. Butler fastened chains around her and it is not unlikely that she will be pumped out later after the holes in the hull have been temporarily stopped. She will then get permanent repairs.
