Young Voters' Meeting at Kilbride.

Not in the history of Kilbride was
such a political meeting held as was
last night, and never was there such
an outburst of real enthusiasm ac-
corded a conquering trio in St. John's
West. The meeting was held in the
Young Men's Kilbride Athletic Hall
and long before the arrival of the
Liberal Progressive candidates, BEN-
NETT, MULLALLY and MARTIN, the
immediate surroundings were ablaze
with stage powder, and for miles
around the firing of musketry could
be heard. When the candidates ar-
rived they were met by many of the
prominent residents and escorted to
the hall amidst the wildest cheering.
After the cheering had subsided, Mr.
Edward Walsh was moved to the
chair, amidst the hearty approval of
the biggest audience ever assembled
there at a political meeting and among
which were many ladies and gentle-
men from near-by settlements.

Hon. Mr. Bennett then briefly out-
lined the object of the meeting, and
thanked the young voters of the sec-
tion and those of the adjacent places
for the splendid reception given, and
was pleased to see so many of the
ladies present. The meeting Mr. Ben-
nett said, was called at the request
of the young voters of Kilbride, and
that their attendance was so large,
and their enthusiasm so pronounced,
was the best evidence that Kilbride
would stand by its traditions and vote
the straight Liberal ticket on Nov.
3rd as it has done in the past. Hon.
Mr. Bennett then introduced his col-
leagues, Mr. J. J. Mullally and Mr. J.
T. Martin, and announced that these
gentlemen would first address the
gathering, after which he would en-
deavour to review the different phases
before the country, and also that he
would deal with the disgraceful, ven-
erous and vituperative campaign be-
ing carried on by his political oppo-
nents of the Coaker Party, Mossdell,
Campbell, Brownrigg and Squires.

Mr. Mullally excelled himself in his
speech last night and in conclusion,
said Mr. Mullally, make no mistake
that St. John's West will not see John
R. Bennett robbed of his seat in the
West End. Vote the straight ticket,
said he, for BENNETT, MULLALLY
and MARTIN, then you will stand out
prominently as the men who have
saved the country from pawns and
usurpers. When Mr. Mullally closed,
said Mr. Martin was called upon to
speak to the people.
