



**Of Interest to Philatelists**

**NEW STAMPS FROM AN OLD LAND**  
 (Saturday Night)  
 Postage stamp collecting is a universal hobby. Canada has its thousands of enthusiasts, and news about stamps, especially new special issues, is eagerly sought by them.  
 Mr. C. H. Shields, Commissioner of the Chinese Postal Service, at Shanghai, who has spent 25 years in China, recently arrived in Canada on the Empress of Asia.  
 In celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of the Chinese postal service, said Mr.

Shields, "there was issued a very interesting little set of commemorative stamps. The issue consists of four values of the same shape and size as the Chinese revolutionary issue of 1912 or the familiar Quebec Tercentenary stamps of 1908 and the Confederation stamps in Canada issued in 1917.  
 "The values are 1 cent, orange; 3 cent, blue green; 6 cent, gray; 10 cent, dark blue. One cent is the local letter rate, three cents the general domestic rate, six cents the double rate, and ten cents the foreign rate. The reason for issuing the six cent stamp is that under the famine surcharge, the registry fee is six cents,

although normally five cents. It is noteworthy in this connection that the Chinese stamps use postal union colors to correspond with the denomination rather than the rate.  
 "The three portraits used on these stamps are those of President Hsu Shi-Chang, fifth president of the republic, who took office in 1918; Chin Yung-Peng, the Premier and formerly concurrently Minister of War; and Yeh Kung-Chow, who was Minister of Communications when the issue was planned, but later resigned. He made a fine record for constructive achievement during his brief tenure of office and, though not in office yet remains one of the most influential

political figures in the country, and a forerunner of better things in Chinese politics.  
 "The denomination, in Chinese characters, is in circular tablets shown in the upper corners. An arched label above the president's head bears the Chinese characters reading, in Mandarin, 'China Postal Service Foundation Twenty-five Years Anniversary' to make the translation as literal as possible.  
 "It will be recalled that the old Imperial government celebrated the taking over of the postal service from the customs by surcharging all of the

stamps of former issues in eight (with denominations in candareens) with new values in cents. The postal service has consistently improved under a series of capable foreign Postal Commissioners, until to-day it is efficient, far-reaching, reasonably rapid as speed in this part of the world goes, and cheap. The Chinese postman in his slouchy green padded clothes is a far cry from the 'postie' at home, but you get your mail, and that is the main thing. In fact, the foreign postal agencies no longer belong in China, for their need is a thing of the past. At the Washington Conference one of the important matters agreed upon was the abolition

of the postal offices of foreign governments in China. Under this agreement, China will assume complete and absolute control of her postal services on January 1st, 1923.

**Employment Outlook Brighter.**

**PORT AT PORT REOPENING.**  
 Recent prospects of a brighter outlook for Steel and causing some activities in iron ore and other materials used in smelting are to be noted. At present a good deal of labour is being given at Bell Island and nearly 1400 men are employed there. A large quantity of ore which has been in stock pile for some time is now being marketed and a fleet of steamers is engaged carrying the ore to the German market. Trade on the Iron Isle is in consequence booming, after over two years of depression. It is understood that the D. I. & S. Co. will work the Lime Stone quarries at Port au Port during the summer. Mr. H. B. Gillis, the Company's representative, who arrived from Sydney by the Sable I. recently visited Agathuna with a view to reopening the works. Some 200 men have been engaged and they are now at work quarrying the stone.

**Water Supply Pure.**

**INSPECTION AND ANALYSIS PROVE ASSERTION.**  
 The purity of the water supplied the city from Windson Lake has been the subject of much discussion among householders of late and various rumours of foreign matter getting into the water have been circulated. As a matter of fact for some days past the water at times has not been as clear as it should be and besides it was noticed to have an odor, and taste of animal matter. On Monday last the Mayor and Councilors paid a visit of inspection to the Lake and screen house. The filter was found to be in complete working order and everything looking in a satisfactory manner. The water has been analyzed by Mr. D. J. Davies, B. S. C., and found to be pure. So householders have no cause to be alarmed.
