

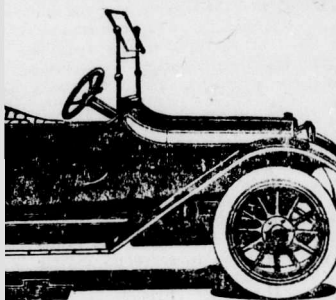

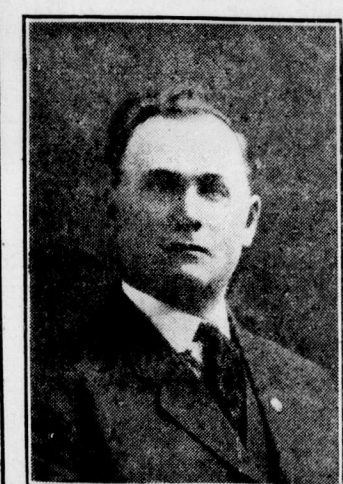

FELL THROUGH BRIDGE.

Walter Booth's Narrow Escape at
Watson's Mills.

Tillsonburg, July 28.—What may
yet prove to be a serious accident,
happened at Watson's Mills, six miles
south of town, at 10.45 a.m. on Thurs-
day, when a large water tank and a
team of horses driven by Walter
Booth, of Goshen, crashed through a
wooden bridge and were all plunged
into the creek.

Mr. Booth's cries for help were
heard by neighbors, who rushed to
his aid and removed him and the
horses from the water. Dr. Bennett
was on the scene of the accident a
few minutes later.

The unfortunate man was found
to have sustained several scalp and
flesh wounds and a fracture of the
arm.

NEW ONTARIO SWEPT BY FIRE.

List of Dead Reported to be 184.

COCHRANE AND MATHESON SMOKING RUINS.

The most disastrous bush fire ever
experienced in the north country
started on Saturday afternoon near
Porquios Junction, 18 miles south of
Cochrane, and rapidly spread in all
directions, carrying death and des-
truction in its path.

Entire communities were wiped
out, flames licked the fringe of the
larger towns, and leveled death and
toll, which cannot be accurately com-
puted at present. So far 184 persons
have been reported dead, with scores
suffering from injuries, many of
whom will likely succumb.

It is feared many prospectors have
been trapped. Relief trains were at
once sent from all the surrounding
centres, including Toronto. Refugees
destitute of food and clothing are
pouring into the more organized
towns.

Nushka suffered worst. It consisted
of frame dwellings and stores, and
has been threatened for some days.
It was practically surrounded, walls
of fire cutting off all escape to the
south and north, and, with no river
or lake at hand, the inhabitants were
doomed.

Cochrane is entirely burned, with
the exception of Second and Third
Avenues, 18 persons being reported
dead and 34 injured. The proximity
of the T. and N. O. tracks and the
lake saved most of the residents.

Ramore, a small settlement, was
completely wiped out.

Matheson is totally destroyed, with
the exception of two houses, and 34
bodies are laid out on the station
platform.

South Porcupine and Timmins Escape.

South Porcupine suffered only the
loss of the sawmill at the station,
and at Timmins the flames were
checked on the outskirts, after lick-
ing up 17 houses.

At the great paper mill at Iroquois
Falls, nothing remains but part of the
mills and one store. Fifteen dead
scores injured is the toll of the
flames.

The list of dead is likely to be
largely increased from among the
outlying settlers. One settler, with
ten children, perished while his wife
was absent to seek aid.

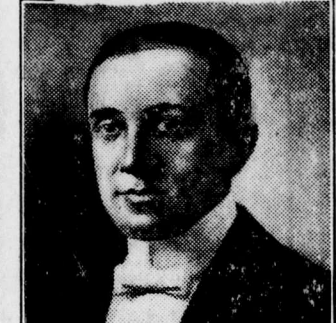

FORMER AYLMER MAN SUC- CUMBS TO HEAT IN DETROIT.

News was received on Saturday of
the death of Alfred C. Martin, by his
parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Martin, of
this place, which occurred at Harper's
Hospital, Detroit. Death was caused
by heart prostration, due to the in-
tense heat of last week. Mr. Martin
had been in excellent health until he
went home last Wednesday, and
complained of severe suffering from
the heat. All day on Thursday he
was packed in ice to reduce his high
temperature, and on Friday was
taken to Harper's Hospital, where he
passed away on Saturday morning,
despite the best medical attendance
procurable. The late Mr. Martin was
but forty years of age, and was a
prominent man in the automobile in-
dustry in Detroit. He was born in
Vienna, Ont., and was educated in
Aylmer, and learned his trade, that of
machinist, with the Aylmer Pump and
Scale Co. Ten years ago he moved to
Detroit, and has been connected with
various automobile concerns there,
and at the time of his death was a
department superintendent with the
Chalmers Motor Company. He has
also been in the employ of the Cad-
illac and Brush Motor Car Compan-
ies. Mr. Martin was a member of
Palestine Lodge, F. and A. M., Michi-
gan Sovereign Consistory, and of
Moslem Temple, A.A.O.N.M.A., and
the funeral was held under Masonic
auspices.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs.
E. C. Martin, of this place, deceased
is survived by his widow, formerly
Miss Maud Widner, of Paris, one
daughter, Nora, aged nine, and two
sisters, Mrs. A. C. Leverton, of De-
troit, and Mrs. Ed. Turner, of Ayl-
mer. The funeral took place on Mon-
day from his late residence, 196 Rich-
ton Avenue, and interment was made
in Oakview Cemetery, Detroit. Mr.
and Mrs. E. C. Martin and Mr. Ed.
Turner left on Saturday for Detroit
to attend the funeral. Mr. Martin
was very popular here, and his
friends were shocked to hear of his
sudden death.

ALLIES LOSE \$25,000,000 IN MUNITIONS IN NEW YORK EXPLOSION.

Property loss estimated at about
\$25,000,000 was caused early on Sun-
day last by a series of terrific ex-
plosions of ammunition awaiting ship-
ment to the Entente Allies, and stor-
ed on Black Tom Island, a small strip
of land jutting into New York Bay,
off Jersey City.

The detonations, which were felt
in five states, began with a contin-
uous rapid fire of small shells, then the
blowing up of great quantities of
dynamite and other high explosives,
followed by the bursting of thousands
of shrapnel shells, which literally
showered the surrounding country
and waters for many miles around.

Fire that started soon after the
first great crash destroyed thirteen
of the huge warehouses of the Na-
tional Storage Company on Black
Tom Island, in which were stored
merchandise valued at between
\$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000. The flames
shootling into the clouds were re-
flected against New York's sky line
of towering office buildings, which
only a few moments before were
shaken to their foundations, as by
an earthquake. Miles of streets in
New York City alone were strewn
with broken glass and shattered
signs.

The loss of life was very small.
The cause of the explosions is laid
to German agents.
