STRATHCONA AT NEW YORK.

His Lordship Interviewed Regarding His Regiment.

Lord High Commissioner of Canada Declined to Talk of the British Elections, but Took Occasion to Say Some Complimentary Words About Mr. Chamberlain—A Wave of Imperialism Sweeping Over Europe Just Now.

New York, Oct. 8.—Lord Strathcona, G. C. M. G., the Lord High Commissioner of the Dominion of Canada, arrived on the Cunarder SS. Etruria yesterday.

Lord Strathcona furnished and equipped a regiment of 650 horses and sent them from Canada to fight the Boers at his own expense. The regiment consisted chiefly of scouts and cowboys, and was commanded by Col. Steele.

"Much against my will," said Lord Strathcona, "the regiment has been named 'Strathcona's Horse,' and being composed of the cowboys and scouts, it did duty as scouts in fact. I regret to say, which accounts for the regiment's depletion. Many have been killed, and a very large number wounded. They left in March, and I do not know when they will be back."

The Lord High Commissioner left for Montreal last night, and when asked what he thought of the result of the British elections, said with a smile:

"It would not be proper in the Lord High Commissioner of Canada to permit himself to discuss English politics, but I may say that there is a wave of Imperialism sweeping irresistibly over Europe. As for Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, I have known him for 40 years back, have known him outside of politics, and very intimately indeed, and a more upright man I never met in my life. The British Consul-General, Sir Percy Sanderson, G. C. M. G., returned from a two months visit to Europe on the Etruria yesterday."

GREAT HONORS FOR ROBERTS.

General Will He Made an Earl and Get a Present of \$500,000.

London, Oct. 8.—Great honors are preparing for Lord Roberts when he returns. It is reported that he will be made an earl, and will receive a present of half a million dollars in cash, and perhaps a county castle.

Roberts Home Coming.

London, Oct. 8.—Lord Roberts, The Daily News announces, will leave South Africa during the last week in October.

The authorities have decided to limit the number of colonial troops who are to be the Queen's guests in London, to 500.

16,000 BOER PRISONERS.

Lord Roberts Cables That He Has That Number on Hand and That Those Surrendering Are Daily Increasing.

London, Oct. 8.—A despatch received from Lord Roberts, dated Friday, Oct. 5, says:

"The number of prisoners captured or surrendered is daily increasing, and must now aggregate nearly 16,000 men."

"Commandant Muller has surrendered to Clery and Commandant Dicksen and others are on their way to Pretoria to surrender."

"A detachment of the London Irish endeavored to surprise a party of Boers near Buffenstein, Oct. 4, but had to retire after six hours' fighting, with six men wounded. The Boers suffered heavily."

Pte. O'Kelly is Dead.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—A cable from Ottawa brings word of the death of Pte. G. M. O'Kelly of the 2nd C. M. R. Battalion, formerly a member of the Mounted Police. No particulars are given.

Lord Seymour Wounded.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—The following cable was received at the Militia Department to-day:

"Cape Town, Oct. 6, 1900.—279. Seymour, Lord Strathcona's Corps, severely wounded, Krugersdorp, Oct. 1."

"Sgd." Milner.

Lord E. Seymour is a son of the Marquis of Hertford.

BOERS BURNED 24 WAGONS.

They Carried Off the Supplies, But Released the Prisoners Taken.

Durban, Oct. 8.—Details of the disaster to the British convoy near De Jagers Brit on October 1, show that the earlier reports underestimated its extent. The Boers numbered 450 and were commanded by Gen. Christian Botha. The British force, comprising the Durban Volunteers, was completely surprised. The British had outmanned when the attack commenced, and the native ox drivers were shot down. The British casualties were one officer killed and six wounded. The Boers captured 53 prisoners, who were subsequently released. The Boers captured one Hotchkiss gun and set fire to 24 wagons. They carried off the supplies, together with the oxen and mules, leaving one mule wagon for wounded.

Dewet is Still Fighting.

Aliwal North, Cape Colony, Monday, Oct. 1.—Gen. Dewet is reported to be a few miles south of Wepener, in the Orange River Colony, about 70 miles north of Aliwal North. The Boers near here are in a state of great excitement. All the outpost camps have been called in and preparations are being made to defend the town. A detachment of Cape police engaged in reconnoitering Rouxville (somewhat less than half way between Aliwal North and Wepener) rode out of one end of the town as the Boers galloped in at the other end. Two mounted Australians were captured. Some of the Rouxville merchants have destroyed their

stocks, to prevent them from falling into the hands of the Boers.

Gen. Buller at Work.

Lydenburg, Tuesday, Oct. 2.—Gen. Buller's force has been pursuing the Boers through Pilgrim's Rest and Krugersdorp. He is now near Ohrigstad, and is still marching northward. The Boers now here have made a stand.

Boers Retreated With Guns.

London, Oct. 8.—It is estimated, according to the Pietmaritzburg correspondent of The Daily Mail, that from 4,000 to 5,000 Boers have retreated from Pilgrim's Rest, north-east of Lydenburg, with four long guns and twenty-two other guns. The correspondent understands that their long tom ammunition is almost exhausted.

London Volunteers Off For Home.

Cape Town, Oct. 7.—The City of London Volunteers sailed for England to-day, their departure being attended by a host of tremendous enthusiasm. Sir Alfred Milner, in the course of an address thanking them for their services to the Empire, told them that a still greater reception awaited them at home.

Boer Prisoners Protest.

London, Oct. 8.—A despatch from Bloemfontein says that one of the Boer prisoners in the Green Point (Cape Colony) encampment has written to The Post protesting against a continuance of the struggle. If the end is not reached soon, he declares, the prisoners at Cape Town and elsewhere will issue a public protest.

To Get a Home For Kruger.

Lorenzo Marquez, Oct. 6.—Mr. Kruger's grandson, Eloff, will sail on Oct. 10 to prepare a residence in Brussels for the former President of the Transvaal. The latter will sail on the Dutch cruiser Gelderland a few days later.

Boer Refugees in Holland.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Boer refugees continue arriving in increasing numbers at Marseilles. Two German ships brought over 1,200 this week, and two French ships 950, including women and children.

These people belong to the well-to-do class. They are transported to Holland across France and Belgium by special trains.

Sir Robert Reid, Liberal, who was connected with the Venezuelan arbitration, had been re-elected for Dumfriesshire by a slightly decreased majority, while the Liberal Imperialist, Mr. H. H. Asquith, formerly Secretary of State for the Home Department, had been returned for East Fife with double his previous majority.

The Ministerialist gain remained 23, and the Opposition had won 16 seats.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The Catholic Church has bought, for \$180,000, a palatial residence for the papal nuncio in Paris, Mgr. Lorenzelli.

Ontario's population is 58,193, an increase of 1,191 during the year; the value of property has increased \$37,460.

The Philippine Insurgents continue to show renewed activity, and are harassing the Americans at different points.

A special despatch from Glasgow says another case of bubonic plague has been discovered in the city of the city hitherto free from the disease.

The Hamilton St. Vincent de Paul Society has made a grant of \$200 to the sufferers of the House of Providence fire. Mr. William Gibson, Signor Paciotti, Rome's leading electrician, has discovered a means of utilizing electricity in discharging projectiles, which is said to give better results than powder.

Friday afternoon a young man named William Shoultice, aged 21 years, who lived with his father near Pinkerton station, was instantly killed by a tree falling on him.

A Duluth despatch says the traffic on Lake Superior this season has been the greatest on record, the tonnage to date having been 19,978,475. The September movement of freight was 3,411,453 tons.

The United States Secretary of the Interior has decided to dispose of the Indian lands ceded to the Chippewas in Minnesota, amounting to 74,125 acres. They consist of pine and agricultural lands adjoining the White Earth reservation.

While Mrs. William Faith, her son and her uncle, Andrew Watson, of New York city, were crossing a railroad track Saturday afternoon at Mount Pleasant, N. Y., their wagon was struck by the train and they were thrown out. The son was instantly killed, and Mrs. Faith and Mr. Watson were severely injured. Mrs. Faith not being expected to live.

BOERS HOLD WEPENER.

Also Rouxville and Ficksburg, and the British Are Trying to Surround Them.

Cape Town, Oct. 9.—The Boers now occupy Wepener, as well as Rouxville and Ficksburg, in Orange River Colony, and the British are attempting to surround them.

BANDS OF GUERRILLA BOERS.

Gen. Barton Engages Some of Them Near Krugersdorp.

Johannesburg, Oct. 6.—General Barton is fighting with a Boer commando northeast of Krugersdorp. Several bands of guerrillas have reappeared in that district recently, and more are expected.

Mr. Edwards, an Englishman commanding a Boer force, who became prominent after the Jameson raid on account of a rabid anti-British speech in London, has surrendered in Krugersdorp with a few men.

A colonial force has gone south to Elandsfontein to clear the Boers out of the Klip Riversburg Hills. These hills have been a regular rendezvous for the burghers lately.

The ignorant Boer inhabitants here attribute the fact that the British officials are selling and distributing food to a desire on their part to clear out the district before they give up the country. These same people still readily believe and circulate the most absurd stories about intervention by the powers.

Colonel Henry, who wears the decoration of the Star of India, and who is reorganizing the Police Department here, has introduced the system of identification by finger marks, and in this way intends to register every native. This plan will be of great assistance in the distribution of passes, the regulation of labor and the suppression of illicit liquor selling.

To Pass the War Losses.

Cape Town, Oct. 8.—The Cape House of Assembly to-day passed a second reading a bill to raise a loan of £300,000 to ensure the immediate payment of half the losses sustained by private persons throughout the war.

Disaster in the Transvaal.

Heidelberg, Transvaal Colony, Oct. 8.—Five persons were killed and 75 injured in a railway collision at Kurishor last evening. The accident was due to an error in signalling. One official has been arrested.
