LIBRARIAN APPOINTED

For the New Free Library for London.

Salary \$750 Per Annum—Those Who Tried for the Position and Did Not Get It.

A meeting of the Free Library Board was held in the City Hall last night to consider the appointment of a librarian for the new library. The number of applications for the position was very large, and they came from all over Western Ontario—from schoolboys 15 years old; from men in all spheres of life, and from women, too. The applications were referred to a recent meeting to a special committee to weed out a few and recommend them for a vote. In some cases it was found the applicants could not spell the simplest words or even write a plain hand.

The following were considered as capable to fill the position: Charles T. Glass, H. B. Ashplant, James O'Brien, Thomas Porter, Dr. E. T. Ede, Robert J. Blackwell, Rev. George I. A. Thompson, John Tanton and P. E. Backe. All belonged to London. At last night's meeting each member of the board was allowed to mark his ballot for three persons, and in each ballot the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes dropped out. In the first vote Mr. Backe retired, in the second Messrs. O'Brien and Tanton, in the third Mr. Porter and on the fourth Messrs. Ashplant and Ede. This left Messrs. Glass, Thompson and Blackwell in the fifth ballot; then Mr. Blackwell received five votes, Mr. Glass two and Mr. Thompson one. Mr. Blackwell was declared chosen, and his salary was fixed at \$750 a year.

Mayor Little did not vote, but with Architect Matthews acted as one of the scrutineers.

The committee appointed to interview the managers of the Workingmen's Free Library in reference to taking over that library reported that the labor organizations were opposed to the propositions.

The members present were Chairman Robert Reid, Messrs. E. R. Cameron, Talbot Macbeth, Joseph T. Marks, H. Dignan, James Egan, Henry Macklin, Secretary Keene and Architect Matthews.

Want More Water.

Commissioners Contemplate Augmenting the Supply.

Increase of Over \$5,000 in the Yearly Estimates—Electric Railway Probabilities—Conduit Changes.

The water commissioners held their regular meeting yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Commissioner Cowan was in the chair, and there were also present Mayor Moore, Commissioner Judd, Engineer Moore, Secretary Ellwood and Inspectors Plawlow and Platt.

Applications were received for the leasing of the Springbank Hotel. At present it is occupied as a rest by Benj. Johnston, on condition that he supply suitable accommodation to visitors.

The mayor asked if the matter had not better lay over until the electric business was settled.

"Is there any probability of the company requiring the ground this year?" asked the chairman.

"I think there is a very strong probability," answered the mayor.

And the applications were laid over. The auditor's report for the quarter ending Feb. 28, 1895, was received and adopted. It stated that \$35,000 of the \$50,000 waterworks debt had been paid to the city or revenue account. The receipts for the quarter were \$6,564 27, and the disbursements \$4,860 18.

Engineer Moore recommended some changes in the conduit pipes from the ponds to the pumping house. The alterations consist of replacing the wooden conduit from the west pond with a cast iron one, to cost \$1,500, and that the wooden conduit leading to the east pond be replaced with a glazed tile one, to cost \$300. The recommendation was adopted. The purchase of three engine indicators was deferred. A \$100 watering cart will be purchased for Springbank.

Mr. Moore also advised the procuring of more water. He pointed out that the supply would likely be short next summer. He mentioned a couple of springs—one west of the present property, and the other across the river, near Ward's—that might be procured.

The mayor and Mr. Judd wanted to know why the springs running into the river could not be utilized.

The engineer replied that the water could be collected, but the cost would be greater than either of the other methods.

The matter was laid over until the commissioners can visit the property in question.

Must Pay the Village.

Ex-Treasurer Nicholls, of London West, to Pay or Be Sued.

Threatened Action for Damages—Doings of the Council.

Mr. Wm. Nicholls, ex-treasurer of the village of London West, will have to hand over to the corporation, within the next ten days, the sum of \$904, or the village solicitor will institute proceedings against him. Such was a motion passed at last night's meeting of the London West council.

Solicitor McPhillips, of London, acting for Mr. J. H. Flood, sent in a letter asking for compensation for damage done to his client. It stated that Mr. Flood was driving in London West on the evening of March 28, and as the C. P. R. overhead bridge on the Wharncliffe road, his rig had a difference with a mound of snow and ice, which resulted in bruising Mr. Flood's head, several stitches being necessary.

"Well, if a few stitches had been put in a little lower down his face before he left London, it is not likely he would have needed any when he returned," said Councilor Moore.

"Yes, he would have had to drive out several feet to come in collision with this ice," remarked Deputy Reeve Murdoch. "I move it be filed for future reference."

A. J. Houston and E. T. Tallent asked for remission of taxes, as they had been ill for six months and two years respectively. The finance committee will attend to the matter.

A complaint was received from J. B. Leigh that the water from Blackfriars street had flooded his front yard. The only egress and ingress was by sailing or climbing over the back fence. Referred to the board of works.

The account of W. D. Stanley, of Lucan, for \$50, for auditing, was up again. As the last year's council had accepted his work, it was ordered to be paid.

Gibson Wright, of Winnipeg, sent his eleventh letter to the village in regard to taxes on a certain lot which he claimed to have sold. He also wanted his bill for taxes on the property he still owned. Clerk Simpson will write him.

Commissioner Laing, of the Provincial Government, sent in a bill for \$225 50, and stated that he had drawn on them for the amount.

Reeve Macdonald said at this juncture that newspapers had stated and individuals had been saying that all these investigations had been made on account of spite. Only children and fools indulge in spite; it is out of place.

In a council. If we have taken wrongfully from any man, we will pay him back, and we ask for the same justice. We took the only course in getting things put in better shape, and did our duty in recovering what was justly ours.

The clerk said that a copy of the resolution passed at last month's meeting of the council in regard to ex-Treasurer Nicholls had been sent to him.

Councillor Moore said that Mr. Nicholls had ample time to make reparation. Last year's council had waited five months for their books. He (Moore) had done everything in his power to help the village and had been abused, as well as other members of the council, by certain newspapers and individuals. "I move that Mr. Nicholls be ordered to hand over the sum of \$904 inside of two days, and in default that the matter be put in the solicitor's hands to take proceedings, criminal or otherwise, as he sees fit." The time was extended to ten days and the motion carried.

The treasurer's statement was adopted, and a number of accounts passed. The by-laws in relation to peddlers' licenses and dog taxes will be enforced. A committee was appointed to meet with the manager of the London Electric Company in regard to certain lamps which it is claimed have not been lighted.

Those present were Reeve Macdonald, Deputy Reeve Murdoch, Councillors Hamilton, Moore and Andrews and Clerk Simpson.
