Sir Wilfrid Laurier

Lord Aberdeen Has Recommended that the New Premier Be Knighted.

Leading Liberals Confer With Their Chief at Montreal.

Premier Fielding May Be a Member of the New Cabinet.

Sir Charles Tupper Still Holds on to Office, but May Resign Before Saturday.

MEETING THE NEW PREMIER.

Montreal, June 30.—Mr. Laurier arrived in town yesterday afternoon from Arthabaska. He was met there on Saturday by Premier Fielding, of Nova Scotia, and Mr. J. Isaac Tarte, and the political situation was discussed. Mr. James Sutherland, M. P., the Liberal whip, joined the party here. Mr. Laurier and Premier Fielding were the center last night around the Windsor, which was crowded with politicians. Mr. Fielding's address here last December in Windsor Hall, created a fine impression, and many conservatives last night admitted that he would be a great source of strength if he joined Mr. Laurier's Cabinet. As he has come this time with Mr. Laurier, the probability is that he will be one of the new Ministers. Premier Blair, of New Brunswick, and Premier Mowat, of Ontario, are expected here tonight.

A great deal of talk took place here over the report that Sir Charles Tupper would not resign until defeated in the House, and that there was a plan to capture a number of the seats now held by Liberals. One of these seats is Argenteuil, and it was reported that Mr. Abbott had been elected by 64, and a deputy returning officer at a poll was said to have had a majority did not initial the ballots. The report, however, was untrue, as a messenger from the latter last night says the returning officer has declared Mr. Christie, Liberal, elected by 73.

Montreal Conservatives are unanimous in saying they hope that Sir Charles will accept the inevitable and resign.

St. John, N. B., June 30.—Hon. H. L. Davies passed through here yesterday afternoon en route to Montreal. At the depot a very large crowd of prominent men met the Maritime Province leader. He was given several hearty cheers as the train moved out of Montreal.

PORK AND BEANS GO UP.

Chatham, June 30.—Two of Kent county's greatest products have risen in price considerably since the election—beans being quoted 5 cents a bushel better, while pork has gone up 25 cents a hundred. Large quantities are being disposed of, and the farmers are feeling considerably happier and richer, thus proving that it is not a calamity that the Liberals have been asked to take the reins of government.

OFFICIAL DECLARATIONS.

Vancouver, B. C., June 30.—Following are the majorities of the members-elect of British Columbia:
Victoria—Prior, 202; Earle, 102; both Conservatives.
Vancouver Island—McInnes (Lib.), 197.
Burnaby, including Vancouver City—Maxwell (Lib.), 418.
New Westminster District—Morrison (Lib.), 355.
Yale-Cariboo—Bostock (Lib.), 247.

It is reported that a protest has been entered in Victoria. The evidence of bribery and corruption is sufficient to unseat both the Conservative candidates, and possibly to disqualify one.

Winnipeg, June 30.—Saskatchewan and Selkirk returns are still incomplete, but the Liberals claim that both seats will show a majority in their favor. Delay is caused by the non-arrival of ballot boxes from the lake points.

Frank Oliver, the new member for Alberta, is named by the Calgary people as Minister for the Northwest in the new Laurier Cabinet.

Ridgeway, June 30.—The official count in the West Elgin election gives Mr. George E. Casey, Liberal, a majority of 726.

Southampton, June 30.—The official count for North Bruce gives McNeill, Conservative, a majority of 19.

THE YOUNGEST MEMBER.

Amherst, N. S., June 30.—Saturday was declaration day here, and H. J. Logan, Liberal, was declared elected by a majority of 155 over the Hon. A. R. Dickey, Minister of Justice. The official figures are: Logan, 3,462; Dickey, 3,307. Cumberland sends probably the youngest member of the new House, Mr. Logan having just passed his twenty-seventh birthday. He is a barrister by profession, being a graduate in law from Dalhousie University, and he enters political life under most favorable circumstances, having won the great county from his opponent after 4 years of Tupperism, notwithstanding the most corrupt influences used against him. THAT RESIGNATION.

Ottawa, June 30.—Sir Charles Tupper says that the Governor-General will return to the capital on Thursday. When asked whether this implied the immediate resignation of the Ministry, the Premier replied by no means, that until such time as the period for holding accounts had elapsed the Government would certainly not step out. It is understood, however, that the Government will resign before the end of the week.

The interesting report is in circulation today that Mr. George A. Cox, of Toronto, is the prospective Finance Minister for Mr. Laurier.

A KNIGHTHOOD FOR LAURIER.
Montreal, June 30.—Your correspondent learns upon excellent authority that Lord Aberdeen held no time, as soon as it became known that Hon. Mr. Laurier had carried the country, in recommending the Liberal leader to her Majesty for knighthood, and that it is the impression in viceregal circles that when the new Canadian Prime Minister takes his place at the Speaker's right in the House of Commons he will do so under no other title than that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

NOTES.

Liberals should demand a recount before the judge in every constituency where the majority declared against them is small.

A private telegram received here today from Victoria, B. C., says that there is evidence of the grossest corruption against the Government men, and the return of Col. Prior and Mr. Earl will be protested at the earliest moment.

It is averred, and on authority unquestionable, that never in its history was the International Governmental Railway used as a party machine to such an extent as in the present contest. Three passes were dealt out from Conservative headquarters all over the province without stint. So glaring was the abuse that it is likely an investigation will be demanded when Parliament convenes.

Ratz Is the Man

For Whom the Majority of North Middlesex Electors Voted.

Two Hundred and Twenty-Four Rejected Ballots, But Most of Them Marked for Ratz—A Recount Demanded.

Albion, Ont., June 30.—Believe it or not, the official returns for North Middlesex, as compiled by the returning officer, have been demanded by the friends of Mr. Ratz, and will take place on Friday. They are confident that he will be elected. The number of rejected ballots—224—is unprecedented. Of these over 100 were marked for Mr. Ratz in the space allotted for his name, and only 109 were so marked for Mr. Hutchins. The intention of these voters is perfectly clear, and it is believed the judge will decree the ballots good. The great majority of the rejected ballots are marked for Ratz in one way or another.

The G. T. R. President and the Liberal Victory.

Prosperity Will Begin to Dawn—He Has Studied Mr. Laurier.

Montreal, Que., June 30.—Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson left Montreal yesterday for New York, whence he sails for England. In an interview Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson stated that while the Grand Trunk Railway has been no part in the elections, yet he was bound to say that so far as he was concerned, he was very well satisfied, and he would say pleased, that the Liberal party had been returned to power. He had no doubt, whatever, he said, but that certain interests had been protected, and he believed that a modification of some of the high duties would be of great benefit to the community at large. So far as he had watched Canadian politics, and more particularly the utterances of Mr. Laurier, he believed that sound legislation would be enacted, and as soon as the Presidential election in the United States is over, when election, he said, generally causes in some degree a suspension of business in that country, consequently hurting the Canadian market, he believed that business would at once begin to improve, and that, providing the country was blessed with a good harvest, prosperity would at once begin to dawn.

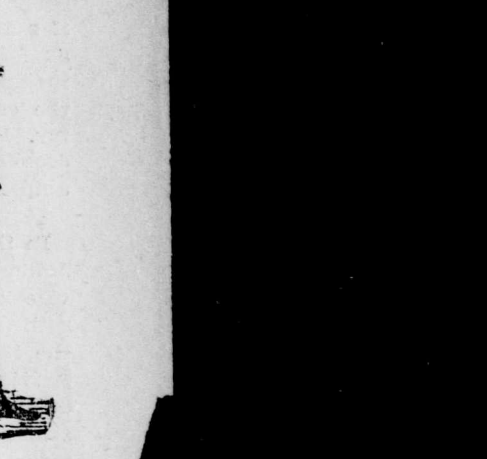
