Imperial Bank of Canada.

The eighteenth annual general meeting of the Imperial Bank of Canada was held, in pursuance of the terms of the charter, at the banking house of the institution in Toronto on Wednesday, June 21, 1893.

There were present: Messrs. H. S. Howland, T. R. Merritt (St. Catharines), T. R. Wadsworth (Western), Wm. Ramsay (of Bowland, Scotland), Hugh Ryan, T. Sutherland Stayer, W. B. Hamilton, Judge Dennistoun, Edward Martin, C. C. Hamilton, Thomas Long, Rev. E. B. Lawler, Wm. Gordon, Clarkson Jones, Richard Donald, John Stewart, E. N. Gooch, Nehemiah Merritt, E. B. Oiler, W. T. Jennings, R. L. Benson, W. F. Haskins (Dunville), J. J. Gould (Uxbridge), David Kidd (Hamilton), John Bain, Q. C., Geo. Robinson, F. H. Gooch, R. H. Ramsay, Robert Thompson, J. G. Ramsay, Thomas Wimsley, A. McFall (Belton), Joseph Whitehead, R. S. Cassels, Robert Beaty, D. R. Wilkie and others.

The chair was taken by the president, Mr. H. S. Howland, and Mr. D. R. Wilkie was requested to act as secretary.

The secretary, at the request of the chairman, read the report of the directors and the statement of affairs.

THE REPORT.
The directors have much pleasure in again meeting the shareholders and beg to submit the eighteenth annual balance sheet and statement of profit and loss account of the bank for the year ended May 31, 1893.

Out of the profits for the year and balance of profits and loss account carried forward from last year, and after making full provision for all bad and doubtful debts:

(a) Dividends have been paid at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum, and in addition thereof a bonus of 1 per cent. amounting in all to \$175,310.93.

(b) Rent account has been increased by \$75,000. Bank premises account has been credited with \$4,712.49.

(c) The fund to cover rebate on bills discounted current has been maintained.

(d) Contributions (authorized by bylaw) have been made to officers and employees' guarantee fund.

The necessity for more commodious premises in Toronto for the staff and for the customers of the bank has been recognized for some time past. Arrangements are now in course of completion for suitable additions and alterations to present premises, which, it is expected, will meet the growing requirements of the business of the bank.
