LATE ROBT. McCUTCHEON

He was One of the Best-Known Pioneers of West Nissouri.

At his late residence, lot 25, con. 4, West Nissouri, there passed away on July 17, one of the pioneers of this township, Robert McCutcheon. He was born in 1859 near Killaloe, Ireland, and with his parents, came to this country in 1881, settling on a farm about a mile from the village of Thorndale. He was soon involved in all the hardships incident to the life of the early settler, but the rugged constitution with which he was endowed made hard work only a pleasure for him. The men of the present generation can have but little idea of what farming meant in those days of chopping, logging, cradling, binding, and in all that work Robert McCutcheon was surpassed by few. In 1881 he married Margaret Powell, Newbury, and settled on the farm, where he resided till his death. Of late years physical weakness prevented active participation in the duties of the farm, but he retained his mental vigor to the last. On July 15 he was stricken with paralysis, and lingered but two days, passing away at the comparatively early age of 64 years. He was a lifelong member of the Methodist Church and was a man of sterling integrity, and open-handed generosity, and was always active in his sympathy with every good cause. A very large number of his friends and relatives gathered on Sunday, July 19, to pay their last respects as he was laid to rest in Brown's Cemetery. A widow and three children survive him. Mrs. McCutcheon, Thameville; Mrs. Cunningham, West Nissouri; Fred W. C. McCutcheon, of the Collegiate Institute staff, is a nephew of the deceased.

APPOINTED ADMINISTRATORS.

JOHN HAYMAN, JUN., FELL

FOUR STORIES AND IS DEAD

Survived Injuries Received by Fall Only a Few Hours.

He Was One of the Best-Known Contractors in London.

Mr. John Hayman, jun., a member of the firm of John Hayman & Sons, builders and contractors, died at Victoria Hospital at 7 o'clock last evening.

The deceased was one of the best-known contractors in the city, having been a member of the firm of John Hayman & Sons for a number of years. He was 23 years of age, and is survived by a wife and two small children, and other relatives.

Mr. Hayman fell from the fourth to the ground floor, a distance of thirty-five or forty feet, striking on a narrow load of bricks, and receiving a fracture of the skull and internal injuries.

His death was the result of a fall sustained at a building being erected on Clarence street, for Messrs. Lawson & Jones.

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TAKES THE REINS TODAY

Former Saginaw Secretary Arrives at Y. M. C. A.

Mr. A. S. Hopper an Experienced Association Man—Begins Today.

Mr. Albert S. Hopper arrived last evening from Ottawa, and this morning assumed charge of the Young Men's Christian Association of this city. The new secretary comes well recommended for his work in London, and there is no doubt but he will build up the institution and give stability to the work. Mr. Hopper gives promise that he will fill the important position with credit to himself and the association.

While born a Canadian, the most of his Y. M. C. A. experience has been gained in the United States, his last post being Saginaw, Mich. Mr. Hopper was brought up near Ottawa and educated there. He married a daughter of Dr. Stephen Wright, of that city.

Previous to his going to Saginaw, he was secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of the city of Toronto, which position he filled satisfactorily until the Galveston flood, nearly three years ago, which wiped out so much of the Lone Star State. He then went to Saginaw, Mich., as secretary of the association there, which was a hard struggle for existence. He resigned his position there in April, upon which occasion the board of directors recognized his faithful work by passing a resolution expressing the deep regret at his determination to withdraw from the leadership of that association.

"During Mr. Hopper's stay among us, of two years and a half," the resolution read, "he has endeavored himself to us by his honest, faithful and devoted services to the welfare of our association. Our work has been strengthened in every department by Mr. Hopper's energy and tenacity of purpose."

The board of directors of the Saginaw association wished for Mr. Hopper and his family the greatest success in his new field of labor, with long and happy days.

Mr. Hopper, however, was not long out of association work. Since April he has been following a nomadic path, for the best part of the year, and decided to accept the offer to come here. He gave up his Ottawa business for a few days in the city a few weeks ago looking into the field. He is well pleased with the city of London, and feels that the work here is of a promising nature.

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
