BERG TOPPLED UPON THE BOAT

Strange Accident in the Gulf by Which a Ship Passenger Lost His Life.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 10.—The steamer Viking, which returned from Labrador, after landing supplies for lumber mills there, reports the loss of a man by a strange accident, on the afternoon of Aug. 26. On that day she was in Islet Bay, near Battle Harbor, and at 5 o'clock in the afternoon a boat in charge of Chief Officer Aitken was sent off to an iceberg to replenish the ship's ice chest. He was accompanied by three of the crew and George Jolly, a passenger, who had asked and obtained permission to go. The boat reached the iceberg without mishap and the work of getting out the ice commenced, but 20 minutes later the top of the berg collapsed, and falling into the water, it precipitated the five men into the icy water. A lifeboat was immediately sent out from the steamer to render assistance, but before it could get to the scene Jolly had gone down for the last time. The boatswain and four men rowed around and groped for two hours in a vain effort to recover the body.

Jolly was a young Englishman, a native of London, and the most energetic of the crew. He was a fisherman, and reports that the fishermen on this side of Hudson's Strait are very busy this season. Every fishing vessel they passed was loaded, and one Newfoundland company had 5,000 quintals of fish, a larger amount than for many years back.

DIED AT A DINNER

A New Yorker Expires While Toasting a Friend.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Arthur W. Ufer, 49 years old, a stock broker, who has lived at the Waldorf Hotel for a number of years, dropped dead at the Manhattan restaurant, early yesterday while attending a dinner in honor of Dr. Louis Morris, surgeon on the monitor Florida, who has been ordered to the Philippines. Mr. Ufer arose and proposed a toast to Dr. Morris and as he did so, fell from the table. He died in a few minutes, heart failure was the cause.

"SUPPRESSED IN ONE WEEK"

Turkey Sees the End of the Insurrection.

ROME, Sept. 9.—A communication received from the Italian ambassador at Constantinople says the Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs has assured him that the most energetic measures will be taken to punish those who were responsible for the recent conflict at Beirut. The minister added that he did not believe any such incident would re-occur, and asserted that the Porte was confident that the insurrection in Macedonia would be "suppressed in one week."

BEBEL AND KAISER

He Says Socialists Should Not Cheer Emperor.

Berlin, Sept. 10.—The eagerly expected article by Herr Bebel, the Socialist Democratic leader, on the question whether the Social Democrats should seek the election of a member of the Reichstag as a vice-president of the Reichstag, was published yesterday. Herr Bebel vetoes the proposition on the ground that if a Social Democrat were elected, he might be acting as presiding officer at the close of the session, when it is customary for the president officer to call for cheers for the Emperor. The Social Democrats would refuse to give these cheers, and this would cause an uproar. Herr Bebel does not believe that the officers would add to the power or influence of the party.

THE WAR CLOUD LIFTS

Japan Sees Peaceful Ending to Chinese Question.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The Japanese legation here sees in the Russian concessions regarding Manchuria the lifting of the war clouds in the far east. The Japanese legation says: "Three events, if the reports are correct, have occurred which are calculated to simplify the situation, namely, the Russian terms, which Mr. Lousar has apparently presented, mark the abandonment of the proposals which the powers found objectionable; Russia has announced her withdrawal from Manchuria next month, and we believe she is sincere, and negotiations are progressing between Japan and Russia for a definition of their respective rights in Manchuria and Corea. These are secret, and it is impossible to forestall the outcome, but we are hopeful that the results will be satisfactory to both Governments."

Yokohama, Sept. 10.—A Pekin telegram which is semi-officially confirmed at Tokio, says the Russian minister has proposed the postponement of the evacuation of the Kirin and Amur districts of Manchuria, set for Oct. 5.

MAY BE FORCED INTO CONFLICT

Turkish Population at Constantinople Clamoring for War With Bulgaria.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The official press reports from the near East to day emphasize the seriousness of the situation there, and confirm the belief of the authorities here that owing to the general irritation throughout European and Asiatic Turkey toward the Christians, as a result of the Macedonian revolt, the Sultan may be swept by the uncontrollable sentiments of his Ottoman subjects into a war with Bulgaria, in spite of the unwillingness of the Porte to precipitate such a conflict. The Turkish officials express gratification at the Russo-Austrian proposal for coercive diplomatic action on the part of the powers at Sofia. They are confident it will be accepted by France; but whether it is adopted or not, the Sultan's hand has already been greatly strengthened, as he is in a better position to act than hitherto. There is no question in official circles here that the Porte will take energetic measures to suppress any trouble at Beirut, Germany has asserted that she will not order her vessels to Deir-el-Zor, relying upon the American warships to protect the consulates. A high diplomatic authority repeated today that Russia has not dispatched, at present, at least, any vessels of her Black Sea fleet to Turkish waters. He asserted that Russia submits to the Porte her proposals for the pacification of Macedonia, she may dispatch her Black Sea fleet to Turkish waters, and it will make no difference to her there than did the Russian squadron at Indian Bay. He added that Turkey could not be expected to inaugurate new reforms until order was restored. The St. James' Gazette, this afternoon says an arrangement has been arrived at which will correct the operation under certain eventualities.

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HOUSE DEBATES REDISTRIBUTION

Opposition Refuses to Accept Work of the Committee.

THE CHANGES IN MIDDLESEX

It Has Lasted Since 1873

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 9.—The redistribution debate began this morning and promises to be lengthy. F. D. Monk, acting Opposition leader, in a speech of an hour and a half dispelled the belief that the Opposition would consent to be bound by the work of the special redistribution committee. He declared that he considered the lack of special rule for guidance in sub-dividing the various counties particularly in Ontario, should be the cause of Waterloo, Middlesex, Victoria and Hastings as evidence that the Government plan was in reality a red gerrymander. He said he saw just one last one (Conservative) member to a population of 28,000 instead of two as formerly whereas Middlesex, Liberal county, would have four members to a total population of 92,000. London having one member and the three rural ridings a member each.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier took the stand that these details were not material for debate. The House had unanimously referred the drawing up of schedules to a special committee and that committee had done its work well. Mr. Monk insisted Waterloo, which he said, was fairly divided before, the change would be observed in shape so drastic that no description can do justice to it. The point of the division of course, is that South Waterloo is expected to return a Liberal. Then there was the case of Middlesex, which is to be given three members for 4,000, while Victoria has only one member for 28,000.

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THE DUTCH AND THE ACHINESE

The Story of a Prolonged and Cruel War.

IT HAS LASTED SINCE 1873

And Has Cost the Netherlands About \$200,000,000—Desperate Tactics of Both the Contestants.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—In connection with the probable surrender to the Dutch of two of the most noted of Achinese rebel chiefs the following is of interest: The colonial troops of the Netherlands have been at war with the Achines (also called the Atchins or Achehns) almost continuously since the year 1873. The cause of the war was the refusal of the Sultan of the Achines to recognize the suzerainty of the Netherlands, over which long negotiations took place. The Sultan sent a secret Embassy to the United States diplomatic agent at Singapore to appeal for the military aid of this country, and at the same time he dispatched commissioners to treat with the Dutch Government. Encouraged by the hope of aid from Great Britain and the United States the Sultan rejected the terms offered by the Netherlands. In the meantime he had obtained from British and American merchants great stores of arms and ammunition. His treachery led to the declaration of war against him by the Governor-General of the Dutch East Indies. The war thus begun has cost the Dutch over \$200,000,000 and the lives of several thousand soldiers. One expedition after another has been sent to Sumatra, but as soon as the revolt has been apparently crushed it has broken out again without a moment's respite. They sent a Weyler to Sumatra, a man who had the blood of the Malays in his veins and who understood their treachery and vindictive cruelty. He was General Karl van der Heyden, who was born and grew up in the East Indies, and who rose from the ranks to be commander-in-chief there. He succeeded in imposing an iron rule over the Achines, but he retired in 1882, and then the revolt broke out afresh and has continued ever since. The Dutch at last, in desperation, resorted to a small triangular district, with a coast line from the port of Oeleh to the fortified post of Kota Pohama. A military dead line was marked by a railroad on an embankment, and if a Malay rebel was found inside this line he was shot on sight. Outside the line no Dutch soldiers could go without danger of annihilation. The Achines number about 2,000,000.
