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PRICE OF MILK UP
Will Be Six Cents a Quart After Nov. 1.

Londoners will have to pay 6 cents a quart for milk this winter. The dairymen who supply the retailers recently advanced the price, and this move was considered at a meeting of the latter, held last night. The retailers agreed that, commencing Nov. 1, and continuing until May 1, the price of milk would be 1 cent in advance of what it has been.

A DESPICABLE ACT
Valuable Bulldog Dashed in the Neck With an Axe.

One of the most despicable acts yet brought to the attention of the local police, is now being investigated.

Mr. Frank Reid, of the firm of W. J. Reid & Co., is the owner of a splendid Boston bulldog. The canine had a kindly disposition, and the household were greatly attached to him. Several days ago he was missed, and it was surmised that he was stolen, as he never strayed from the house. Three days after he disappeared, however, he came back, with an ugly gash on the neck, so deep that it was supposed there was no chance of saving the dog's life. Apparently some vandal had struck the animal with an axe and then turned it loose. A veterinary was summoned and through his efforts it is thought the animal will be saved.

Mr. Reid notified the police and he will give a large reward for information that would lead to the discovery of the person who committed the deed.

EIGHT MORE FIREMEN ARE RECOMMENDED FOR LONDON

No. 3 Committee Adopts the Report of the Special Committee—Other Matters.

THE department matters largely engaged the attention of No. 3 committee of the council at its regular meeting last night, and if certain recommendations to be made are accepted by the council, the fire brigade of London will be increased by eight men.

At last night's meeting of the committee the special committee appointed to deal with the matter of increasing the efficiency of London's fire-fighting facilities handed in its report.

The first clause recommended the placing of a fire alarm box at the corner of William and Philip streets, and was adopted.

The second clause was to the effect that suitable houses for the new engines had been located by the committee, and were obtainable when the committee authorized their purchase.

The third clause dealt with the recommendation of the Underwriters' Association, but the committee decided to let it stand a while.

The fourth clause reported progress on the matter of converting the aerial truck into a water tower.

The fifth clause, which was adopted without discussion, recommended the appointment of one additional fireman in each of the three stations, in addition to the men who will be necessary to man the engines.

Clause 6 stated that five men will be required to operate the new fire engines, two of whom must be expert engineers.

In connection with this clause, Chief Roe stated that he had about 25 applications from men for positions on the brigade, but only one applicant was a competent engineer, and he resided in Brantford.

The committee decided to call for applications for two engineers for the new engines—a first engineer and an assistant—the whole clause being adopted and sent on to the council.

The fifth clause, which was necessary amidst some laughter, the clause recommending that a new fire station be erected and equipped in the north persons were nearby and saw her. A young woman passing through the park hastened to her assistance and Mr. Love, who was in front of his house, reached her about the same time. A boy quickly went for a doctor and the ambulance was called, and pending their arrival an effort was made to revive the young lady. It took time, however, that she was dead.

They were told that a lady was dead at the other side of the park, and on hastening to the scene, Dr. Clarke was horrified to find that the dead girl was his own sister. Dr. Campbell and Dr. Roome tried artificial respiration and Drs. Mason and Bateson were also present, but it was, of course, in vain. The remains were then taken to the family home where the terrible news was broken to the mother and sister.

Heart failure had caused her death. Miss Clarke was but 19 years of age, and had always enjoyed splendid health.

There were a number of young ladies at the scene shortly after the death and nearly all of them recognized the features of one they had known in life, for Miss Clarke was widely acquainted in the city. She had numerous friends and was everywhere a general favorite. The sympathy of these friends and in fact of all citizens will go out to the young lady's relatives.

Mr. Clarke, sen., was in Toronto at the time of his daughter's demise, with her brother, Fred, who lives there. She leaves another brother, Dr. George Clarke, of this city, and one sister, Miss Mary, at home.

Miss Ethel Greer, of this city, was bridesmaid at the marriage on Wednesday afternoon of her cousin, Miss Nettie B. Harvey, of Hamilton, and Mr. George Davidson, of Barrie. Miss Greer wore a dress of gray voile, trimmed with cream lace, and carried a bouquet of chrysanthemums.

WILL OPPOSE RESIGNATION BEFORE THE PRESBYTERY

St. Andrew's Congregation Does Not Want to Lose Its Pastor—Course of Action Decided.

The congregation of St. Andrew's assembled in the lecture room of the church last night to consider the resignation of the pastor, Rev. Dr. Johnston, who has accepted a call to the American Presbyterian Church at Montreal.

There was a good representation, and the question was given a hearty discussion, some time elapsing before the course to be pursued in the matter was decided upon.

Dr. Johnston was present at the opening of the meeting, but after a short service of praise he retired. Before doing so, however, he made a short reference to the matter of his resignation. He had always felt that the church was one of his family, and that he was in a sense, the father, he said. He was leaving them now, but they would always be present in his thoughts. Referring to his resignation, he said he had been requested to reconsider it, but he had made a decision that he would not revoke if he was to have his say in the matter.

Mr. F. G. Rumball was elected chairman of the meeting, and the matter of appointing a committee to look after the interests of the congregation was proceeded with. In opening, Mr. Rumball remarked that in spite of the fact that there was quite a possibility of losing their pastor, things at St. Andrew's must continue to look onward and upward as they had in the past. It was always sad and painful to part with a pastor and here it was doubly so, because of the great love that existed between the pastor and his flock.

The motions and amendment were both seconded, and when put to a vote the motion carried by a large majority.

Dr. Johnston had stated that he felt it was his duty to accept the call from Montreal. St. Andrew's Church was a home to him, and he felt that if a committee was appointed they should make it plain to the presbytery that the congregation were not willing to let their pastor go.

Mr. C. R. Somerville pointed out that the position of the church was unique. The congregation had never been called upon before to decide on the matter of a pastor leaving the church. He felt like opposing the removal. It was easier for Dr. Johnston to see the divine calling than it was for the congregation. He was leaving them now, but they would always be present in his thoughts. Referring to his resignation, he said he had been requested to reconsider it, but he had made a decision that he would not revoke if he was to have his say in the matter.

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
