The bond market is unquotable except nominally, and sales, if any, are made over the counter or on the board. This applies to New York, and specifically to the cash houses, and the foreign exchange has been in a congested condition, interior exchange likewise. As soon as this status can be changed, grain, cotton and copper should be abroad in volume and Europe should be a buyer of American securities at this extreme level. They always have been in the past, and it has started the tendency upward.

Paris, Berlin and London seem moderately composed, and assume more the attitude of interested observers ready to pick up good bargains when the word is given.

Chicago, Oct. 26.—Wheat—The opening was for a half three-quarters up on strong cables, and the improved feeling everywhere. The local pit crowd was inclined to take the bull side, regardless of warnings of the bullies in touch with the financial situation, and prices were higher. The market was not held and some commission house selling around 100% caused the market to go to the low point during the short session. Short covering near the close gave the market a rally of about a cent. Good export business reported at all points, and the cash situation is as sound as ever. The whole trouble at present is that money is tight, and prices are being pulled freely. The business is impeded. Unhappily money cases we can't advise much speculative activity. Cars, 95.

Corn—Follin wheat prices, opened a little higher, and made an extreme tight start to the country. The first eight days of the year, but raised five-eighths on short covering just before the close.
