

**MANAGER KING WANTS
POWER BY KILOWATT****Says Peak Load System Would
Be Unfair to Street
Railway.**

The London Street Railway Company have received no second offer from the hydro-electric commission regarding power.

It will be remembered that some time ago the commission offered power to the company at \$31 per horse power on the peak load basis. Manager King, after making several tests, refused to accept the offer, as picnic days and holidays would be too much of a handicap to purchase power on that basis.

Since that time the commission have been looking into the question, and it was expected that a second offer would be made before this. The latest rumor at the city hall is that the commission will sell power on the average load for the month. The power used during the whole period would be added together, and the amount divided by the number of days used to obtain the daily load.

What is Wanted.

Manager King, in conversation with The Advertiser, stated that he had not heard from the commission, and he expected that a second offer would be made the company.

"The best and most equitable method of selling power to us, would be to sell it on our lines of the power, hour basis," said Manager King. "That would mean that we would pay exactly for what we used. The worst feature of it is that we lose from 15 to 20 per cent in transforming the power. If power were delivered to us as I suggest, it would be eminently fair for both parties."

MAY YOHE PARALYZED**Collapses While Singing in a San Francisco Cafe.**

San Francisco, Aug. 25.—May Yohe (Lady Hope) suddenly collapsed while singing in a cafe, where she began an engagement several weeks ago. Physicians announced that she is suffering from temporary paralysis affecting one side of her body, and it is feared her public career is ended. The collapse came while Miss Yohe was in the middle of her song and when the place was crowded.

THREE BLIND SISTERS**The Trio Helped by Delicate Surgical Operation.**

Saginaw, Mich., Aug. 25.—According to an announcement made from St. Mary's Hospital, Monday, the three daughters of Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Braden, of Tuscola County, who are lying side by side in this city, suffering from operations made, the relief of blindness since birth, will live and, will at least have a partial gift of sight. The children, aged 2, 4 and 6 years, were operated upon last week, and it will be at least a week before the results can be known. Only one eye in each child has been touched so far, and if the operations are successful the other eyes will be treated. The mother is in constant attendance.

WRECK OF THE TYSON**Identity of Vessel That Did the Damage Known to Authorities.**

Amherstburg, Aug. 25.—The identity of the vessel which broke the speed of the lighter Tyson was cast upon the wharf and ruined, is known to the authorities.

There are reports that the matter will be dropped when a settlement for which negotiations are now under way has been completed.

The Tyson will be hauled from the shore today and taken to Detroit for repairs. Most of its cargo of coal has been recovered by a lighter. The two boilers and the two hoisting engines of the Tyson have been located.

BIG COAL BUSINESS**Record-Breaking Handling of Coal at Fort William.**

Fort William, Aug. 25.—More coal has been unloaded at this port since the opening of navigation than in any previous similar period last year. The total is greater than that of any other Canadian port, and is exceeded by only Buffalo, Chicago, Cleveland, Superior and Duluth.

Some 615,000 tons were handled at the C. P. R. dock alone, an amount greater than ever before, and equal to any single dock in North America in an equal period of time.

Orders placed in Cleveland and Buffalo will bring the coal receipts at Fort William up to about 1,250,000 tons for the season. About 90 per cent of the anthracite is for western distribution; much of the bituminous also is for the west, and the remainder will be used by the railways.

BOYS BUY COCAINE.

Montreal, Aug. 25.—After months of work, the police have trapped a druggist in the open sale of cocaine. They arrested on Sunday two boys who had cocaine on them, and who gave the name of the druggist. The police went in plain clothes, and while the boys came in and got the drug, telling the proprietor that the police were "all right," and they were sold cocaine also.

**THE "HERMIT KINGDOM"
ANNEXED TO JAPAN****Japanese Representatives Now in
Korea Ready to Take
Over the Reins.**

Trieste, Italy, Aug. 25.—During the convention, under which Korea, the "Hermit Kingdom," is annexed to Japan, was communicated at 11 o'clock yesterday to the representatives of the powers. The document, which according to now established facts, was signed Aug. 22, will be effective when officially promulgated. This will occur, according to some of the ministers, Aug. 29 or Aug. 30, when the independent existence of the little kingdom, the struggle for whose control started the Russo-Japanese war, will cease.

Baron Birata, minister of the interior, summoned the proprietors of all the Japanese newspapers to his cabinet today and requested them to publish no unauthorized information regarding the situation in Korea. He pointed out that such publication under existing conditions would only make the task of the Japanese government in carrying out the annexation more difficult.

To this the newspapers agreed, and only official statements will be published here before the publication of the promulgation of the convention. The Japanese Government, which has a large number of representatives already in Korea, will be prepared to take over the machinery of administration in Korea, without delay. Considerable uneasiness is reported at Seoul owing to the circulation of threats of disorder following the annexation. These emanate, according to the view taken here, from malcontents who have not received the consideration they are due in provision made by the convention for the future of the Korean royal family, nobles and officials. Sporadic outbreaks in protest against the absorption of Korea by Japan are anticipated, but serious rioting or even widespread objection from the Koreans to the annexation are not expected.

**TO THE NORTH POLE
BY SKY ROUTE****Trendheim, Aug. 25.—The Nordenfjeld Steamship Company's steamer, King Harold, which has returned from the Arctic, reports that she reached the pole in 49 days, 19 minutes. She met the Amundsen expedition on board the Fram at Spitzbergen.**

Amundsen reported that he had discovered a volcano and geyser at Wood Bay Beach, covered with lava. Count Zepelin, who with Prince Henry of Prussia and others, who went to the Arctic to study conditions before an attempt is made to reach the pole in one of the Zepelin airships, has taken possession of a tract of land on King's Bay, which he has named Zeppelinhafen.

A LOST LAUNCH**Supposed to be the "Golden Girl" of Grand Rapids, With Woman Lawyer and Son Aboard.**

Grand Rapids, Mich., Aug. 25.—The boat which left Ludington harbor just before the tornado of Monday night and that was reported yesterday to be probably lost, is the Golden Girl, a gasoline launch in which Mrs. Elizabeth Gassfield and her son, of Grand Rapids, have been cruising the lake all summer, carrying a cargo of fruit or vegetables. The launch disappeared from Chicago with Mrs. Gassfield and son aboard, and it is believed to be impossible that such a tiny craft could survive the terrific storm. Nothing has yet been heard from it. Mrs. Gassfield, a well-known attorney, who has practiced in Grand Rapids for many years.

HOT BLAZE IN OGDENSBURG**Elevator Burned and Steamer Damaged—Loss, \$200,000.**

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Aug. 25.—A fire which burned the elevator of the Rutland Transit Company here yesterday, and a loss of \$200,000, also burned off the hatch covers and woodwork of the steamer Bennington, tied up alongside the elevator.

The steamer arrived from Chicago yesterday, and the elevator worked until after midnight unloading her. Three hours later the fire broke out, presumably from an over-heated journal. Burning debris fell across the hatch covers, and the steamer setting it ablaze. The elevator contained 100,000 bushels of corn and oats, and was insured for \$120,000.

FIRE CHIEFS' HOLIDAY.

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 25.—The International Association of Fire Chiefs held no session today, but gave up the entire day to watching exhibitions of fire apparatus and tests of automobile fire engines. The election of officers will be held Friday. Chief John Thompson, of Toronto, Ont., is expected to be elected president. The chiefs are divided in opinion as to the use of automobile fire engines.

HURLED 50 FEET TO DEATH.

Hamilton, Aug. 25.—Marino Blanklin, 35 years of age, an Italian laborer, working with a gang near Waterdown, was struck by a Grand Trunk train and instantly killed yesterday morning.

He became confused by trains approaching from both directions, and stepped in front of a fast express, which hurled him 50 feet.

**PARTING SHOTS
FOR EX-PRESIDENT****The Train That Took Defeated
Madriz Away Was Fired on
By Estrada's Men.**

Washington, D. C., Aug. 24.—The final word telling of the passing into history of the Madriz Government at Managua was received at the state department yesterday in an official dispatch from United States Consul Olivares, stationed at Managua.

It told of the disorder that preceded the downfall of Madriz at Managua, the escape of the defeated president from the city as shots were fired at his train, and the assumption of the presidency and the command of the local troops by the brother of the revolutionary leader, General Juan Estrada.

Officials of the penitentiary at Managua, where 700 prisoners were confined, called at the United States consulate on Friday night, and voluntarily made affidavits to the effect that the commandant of the prison had hatched a plot to blow up the institution and its inmates in the event of the downfall of the Madriz faction. Prisoners from foreign nations were among those behind the bars.

The foreign consuls promptly laid the matter before Dr. Madriz, who undertook to look into the charges. The president dismissed the commandant of the prison. Before Madriz had abandoned his office, the prison left without guards, had emptied its inmates into the streets.

Many of them obtained rifles and roamed the streets, in some cases firing upon troops of the Madriz faction. As soon as Madriz left, General Aurelio Estrada, a brother of the revolutionary leader, took command of the local troops to police the city.

**TOLL OF CHOLERA
IN ITALY GROWS****Numerous New Cases and Large Proportion of Deaths.**

Tokio, Aug. 25.—The text of the past 24 hours there have been nine new cholera, and twelve deaths here from cholera. At Barietta, eight cases and seven deaths. At Margherita, Savoia, five cases and two deaths. At San Ferdinando, three cases and one death. At Trinitapoli, four cases and three deaths.

NO HELP FOR THE MEN**Fashion Decrees That Women's Big Hats Shall Be Bigger.**

Chicago, Aug. 25.—There is no relief in sight for women, who have accepted the dictates of fashion and struggled under the unwhimsicality of hats of the slip-on or umbrella. That is the edict of the National Association of Retail Milliners, which is holding its annual convention here.

Big hats are to be bigger, and small hats smaller than ever before. There are to be no medium-sized hats. The desire for extremes extends even to the coloring, according to Mme. Maerle, president of the association. The more brilliant the coloring the more nearly to the ideal effect will the new hat conform.

New shades will include magnolia, a shade of orange, coral red, pompadour, a dead rose, heron, a light mahogany and a cajeu, a raisin color.

**MRS. CUDAHY GETS
QUICK DIVORCE****Prenatal Affair, Only Ground Being Incompatibility.**

Kansas City, Aug. 25.—Mrs. "Jack" Cudahy filed suit for divorce in James H. Slovers' court yesterday afternoon. The petition was on account of incompatibility. It had been agreed that the four children should be given to the care of Mr. Cudahy's father, Michael Cudahy, of Omaha.

Mrs. Cudahy's maid, Elizabeth Johnson, testified that she had heard Mr. Cudahy call his wife "improper names," and that he had used vulgar and abusive language to her. This was the extent of the witness's testimony. At 3:45 o'clock the decree was granted, fifteen minutes after the action was begun.

Mrs. Cudahy is free, but the only consideration named is \$1. What the amount of alimony—and it is generally understood that there is alimony—the attorney refused to state.

A friend of the family said this afternoon that Cudahy, Sen., had agreed to pay her \$5,000 for the first year, and \$3,000 per year thereafter as long as she remains single. She is to have the household furniture.

"She expects to go on the vaudeville stage, where she will sing two songs, playing her own accompaniment," this friend declared. "She has an offer of a 30-weeks' contract at \$500 per week. The settlement has been arranged with Cudahy, Sen., by her father."

CROP BETTER THAN EXPECTED.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—Alexander Cavanagh, of the board of trade, was in receipt of a wire from Winnipeg today, which said that the export of Mesera, Finlay, Birrell & Co. reports from Portage la Prairie that farmers in that district were threshing 18 bushels of wheat, where only 10 bushels had been expected.

VETERAN TURFMAN DEAD.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Michael Hayes, 63 years old, veteran driver of harness racers, died last night at Reasburg, Wis., from injuries suffered in a race in that city on Aug. 10, when he was thrown from a sulky.

KAISER'S NAME LEFT OUT.

Christiania, Aug. 25.—According to M. Lovland, chairman of the Nobel committee, the fact that Emperor William's name was not proposed before Feb. 1, precludes his being awarded the Nobel peace prize this year.

**MOIR MADE MISTAKE
IN TRAVELLING EASTWARD****Should Not Have Attempted to
Cross at Niagara Says a
Local Officer.**

"Moir showed pretty poor judgment in going east of Hamilton," said a police officer to The Advertiser. "For one chance that he would have had to get across the river at Niagara, he would have had a thousand at Detroit. There are hundreds of boats all along the bank of the river that he could have rowed across into Michigan, and once there he would have been comparatively safe."

The police believe that the insinuation made in certain Hamilton papers regarding a London lady assisting Moir to escape are utterly unfounded. "The lady hinted at," said an official today, "is one of the best of women, and anything she sent to Moir in the way of magazines, or reading matter was done out of the kindness of her heart. I am sure she never had anything whatever to do with the escape. She would not be a party to such an affair, and has a splendid record in every way."

**"SULLY" DUPLICATES
FEAT OF STREET****Chicago White Sox Receiver Catches a
Ball From Washington
Monument.**

Washington, Aug. 25.—Catcher Billy Sullivan, of the Chicago Americans, today duplicated the feat of Catcher Charles Street, of the Washington Americans, last year, in catching a baseball thrown from a window at the top of Washington Monument, a perpendicular drop of 542 feet.

THRESHER KILLED**Separator Broke Away From Engine—
Albert Moyer Crushed to Death.**

Vineland, Aug. 25.—Albert Moyer, a thresher, while moving his threshing outfit from J. Rittenhouse's barn this morning, he was almost instantly killed. The engine and separator broke away from the engine, and the separator came forward, crushing Moyer against the engine and badly scalding him. Mr. Moyer was extricated within a few minutes, but life was extinct. A grown-up son survives him.

TO MOVE THE GRAIN**Canadian Northern Has Ten Thousand
Cars Stored in Its Yards.**

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 25.—In the various yards over the system of the Canadian Northern are 10,000 box cars and the officials of the road are awaiting the signal from the farmers to throw the mass of trains into action in the movement of the western wheat crop. The company recently added to their stock 15 new mogul engines to assist in the carrying of grain.

"We are ready and fully prepared to handle our share of the harvest, no matter how great or how small may be the need," declared General Sir, Cameron today. Later reports received by the C. N. R. are to the effect that thrashing is general throughout the three western provinces and a fortnight will see a great deal of the grain in the granaries.

TIGER TACKLED TRAINER**New York Man Was Badly Mauled in
a New Jersey Park.**

New York, Aug. 25.—Paul Niering, 33 years old, an animal trainer, of No. 286 South Columbia avenue, Mount Vernon, was badly clawed by the Bengal tiger Prince in the arena at Hillside Pleasure Park, Bellevue, N. J., in the presence of about 200 persons yesterday afternoon.

The tiger was taken out of its cage into the arena yesterday afternoon. Niering mounted its back and rode around amid the applause of the crowd. When he dismounted in forcing him into the arena at the horror of the spectators pinned him to the floor.

The tiger proceeded to claw Niering's back. It ripped his flesh from his neck to his thighs. The trainer, Irwin and McBride, two other trainers, by beating the animal over the head with iron forks, succeeded in forcing him into a corner long enough to allow Niering to crawl out of the cage.

TO STUDY NAVAL MATTERS**Chinese Prince Tsai-Hsun on His Way
to America.**

Shanghai, Aug. 25.—The steamer Manchuria, sailing today, has on board Prince Tsai-Hsun and his suite, coming to the United States, who will spend several weeks in America studying naval matters.

Prince Tsai-Hsun headed the naval mission which recently visited Europe. The mission is due to arrive in San Francisco Sept. 16, and the party expects to sail from San Francisco on the return trip Oct. 4.

DECEYED A DUKE**American Girl Soon to Marry the Duke
of the Abruzzi.**

Paris, Aug. 25.—The Petit Parisien correspondent says Duke of the Abruzzi and Miss Katherine Elkins have been engaged unofficially for more than two years with the approval of King Victor Emmanuel, who stipulated that the official announcements should not be made until the duke had attained the rank of rear admiral, at the end of this year. The marriage of the couple, the correspondent added, will follow shortly upon that event.
