## SALMON PRICES

TAKE A JUMP

Price in London Is Now 25

Cents Can Instead of 20

Cents as in Past.

## TOMATOES GO UP TOO

It Looks as Though the Consumer

Will Have Plenty of Trouble

Regarding Cost of Living.

The cost of living does not appear to be lessening in fact it is going up. Paddy, salmon has gone up. Last year salmon retailed at 20 cents a tin. The price now is 25 cents, with some of the better grades at 30 cents a tin. The season's pack is just coming in. Very little of it being on the market. Some grocers have carried a stock over, and the higher price applies to that also. The increase, it can be seen, is 25 per cent. Rather a nice increase.  
The cost of potatoes in London is going to be high. Some time ago the brokers announced that the canning companies could fill but 40 per cent of the amount ordered in the staple article. The price quoted to the dealers was \$1.17 a dozen, as compared with \$1.12 last year. When the grocers asked about the remainder of the supply, they were informed that they could be obtained at \$1.45 a dozen. A pretty big boost!

## Tomatoes Soaring.

The consumer will have to pay 15 cents a can now. Last year he paid but 12 1/2 cents. Late in the season he paid 15 cents for some of his tomatoes, but this year the grocers say they have no idea what price the vegetable will go to after the available 40 per cent of their order is consumed. The majority are looking for tomatoes to be 20 cents a can.  
Corn has not been boosted as yet, the price being 10 cents a can retail. Peas sell at 12 1/2 cents a can. These prices are the same as last year's. No notification of an increase has been given.  
Some wholesale grocers informed The Advertiser that prices were being obtained from canning companies in New York, Michigan and Ohio. None of the figures were available as yet. The intention of the wholesalers is to bring in a supply from the other side and pay the duty, in case the market goes up again, as it is expected.

## Short on Orders.

"We have been informed that we can receive only 40 per cent of our orders," one merchant stated. "That is not nearly sufficient to put us through. We have been notified that we can get the goods at \$1.45 a dozen, as compared with \$1.17 paid in the past. That is too high, and will make tomatoes prohibitive to the ordinary householder. There will be no other vegetables, and a consequent increase in price for them. That is the reason we are waiting for figures from the American packers."  
Some also report an advance in other lines. Brooms, sugar, smoked fish, all show an increase in price.

Consume fruits have not commenced to come in, and it will be some weeks before they do. The prices have not yet been set for them, but potatoes, which are going to be an increase.  
The consumer does not appear to be in a good position this winter.

SISTER AFTER 23 YEARS

Mrs. Marshall's sister left Ireland many years ago and came to Canada. She was married before long and her husband is a prosperous farmer near Hamilton. Recently she sent her sister passage money to come to Canada, and they were reunited upon her arrival.

Until she came to this country Mrs. Marshall had never seen tomatoes or cauliflower, and there were many other revelations for her.  
Tuesday the sisters spent a happy day together, taking a train for a point west of London, where some of their relatives reside.

## LONDON DOCTOR SELLS

PATENT FOR \$25,000

R. W. Shaw, of King Street,

Realizes Big Sum for American

Rights in Furnace.

Dr. R. W. Shaw, of King street, who holds patents on a furnace which is manufactured in this city, recently disposed of the American rights for a consideration that will approach the sum of \$25,000.  
It is known that more than \$12,000 cash was paid to Dr. Shaw by an extensive manufacturer in the United States, and that for each furnace made under the patents across the line there will be a royalty that will amount to a considerable sum during the first year, and this royalty will continue for a term of years.  
The selling of the American patents does not interfere in any way with the manufacture of the furnaces in London.

A sword in the Dilton museum has just been identified as that used by Joan of Arc, and presented to her by Charles VII, of France. On one side of the hilt, says the London Mail, is engraved a figure kneeling before a cross, and the inscription, "Charles VII," while the other side bears the name "Vaucluse." The sword also bears the arms of France and of the town of Orleans, and the date is 1419.  
Rents and ground values are up every place that has been requisitioned. A house and land in the centre of London gave a rent of \$1,500 a year half a century ago; the ground rent for the land alone now is between \$6,000 and \$7,000. Where it was shillings a square foot near the Bank of England not long ago it is now pounds. In less than two generations the value has risen from 75s a square foot to upwards of \$400. Cost of living is the same problem under all the shining of the sun.

work of 450 men left in prison, who beat down the doors and escaped.  
ARMY IN PITIFUL STATE.  
[Canadian Press.]  
London, Oct. 11.—The Morning Post's Tripoli dispatch, dated Oct. 10, reports that the Turkish army under Munir Pasha, is in a pitiful state from lack of provisions and water, and that Munir Pasha has opened negotiations with the Italian commandant. The Chronicle's Constantinople correspondent says that no Turkish troops will be allowed to pass through any port. It is announced that Bulgaria and Roumania have decided on a general mobilization. A run on the branch Bank of Rome in Constantinople has resulted in the withdrawal of many millions.  
A Tripoli dispatch to the Daily Mail says:  
All Ottoman subjects of Turkish race will be expelled from the town within a week. All the Arab reserves, called up by the Turks, have returned to their homes. The Turkish troops are said to be completely demoralized, and are living on half-rations.

TURKISH FORCES FLEEING.  
[Canadian Press.]  
London, Oct. 11.—A dispatch to the Times from Malta says that on Oct. 1, 200 Turkish cavalrymen advanced to within two miles and a half of Tripoli, and tried to surprise the sentries, but were repulsed. Three Turks were killed.

A majority of the Turkish troops have fled, says the dispatch, by the four caravan routes, but \$500 are concentrated near Tripoli, some distance from Tripoli, behind a chain of hills. They have only four guns, and the others are abandoned in the Tripoli forts, where the Italians found 27, including Krump, dated 1875, and some new ones which had been landed from the Derna.

The Times Tripoli correspondent, in a dispatch dated Oct. 8, describes the Turkish army as being in an unenviable plight, and Munir Pasha as "a dear old gentleman incapable of independent action without instruction from Siamboul."  
Munir Lacks Spunk.  
"He has been marching to and fro in the desert," continues the correspondent, "wanting to attack the Italians, but lacking the backbone to carry through his plans. Finally, he fled about a day's march outside the town, while the camels were sent unescorted into the interior. Realizing that the Turkish regime was at an end and that they were not likely to get their pay, the camel men decamped with the camels and loads."  
"Nearly all the local conscripts, as well as the Arabs, who were armed by the local authorities, deserted, and Munir Pasha, in despair, opened negotiations with the Italian commandant. As the Turks left both artillery and rifles in Tripoli there was no intention of a serious resistance. The story is one that should fill Shekhet Pasha's hours with grief."  
Warships joined in.  
Tripoli dispatches the Times dated Oct. 10 says:  
Last night the naval outpost line around the town was disturbed by hostile movement along its front. The Italians fired many volleys, and the warships joined in with shrapnel and shell. No Italian casualties are reported.

The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says:  
The Italian military authorities have seized the offices of the imperial public debt administration in Tripoli and expelled all the officials, who have been given six days in which to quit the country. The council of the public debt will protest to Italy, and the powers on behalf of the bondholders.
