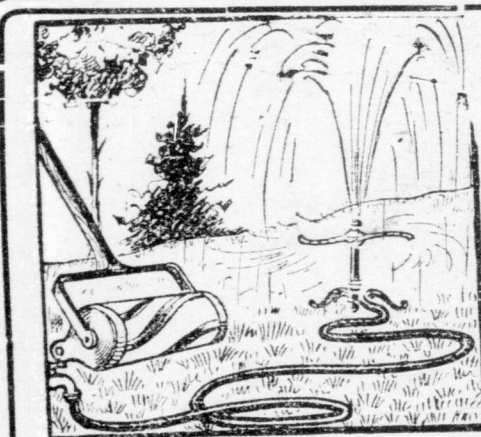

MELVILLE CHURCH OF LOBO CALLS INNERKIP PASTOR

Important Business Transaction at Special Meeting of London Presbytery.

A special adjourned meeting of the Presbytery of London was held in St. Andrew's Church on Thursday afternoon, Dr. Munro presented a call from Melville Church, Lobo, to the Rev. Robert McCullough, of Lobo. The call, which is for \$1,000, with a manse and glebe of five acres with the usual vacation.

Mr. A. McLean and Mr. L. Nagel, of Lobo, appeared in support of the call. The people of Ivan and Lobo are enthusiastic and are spending \$600 on the manse to make it modern for the new minister.

Rev. Dr. McCrae, a former co-pastor, Mr. McIntosh and others, spoke in high terms of Mr. McCullough. Dr. Munro was appointed to prosecute the call before the Paris Presbytery. Should Mr. McCullough accept, the date of induction will be arranged by the moderator and clerk. Mr. McCullough will preach, Dr. Munro will address the minister, and Mr. Earchman the people.

Dr. McDonald's reasons for appeal to the synod agent the election of the clerk caused a long and very able discussion, participated in by Mr. McIntosh, Dr. Ross and Dr. McCrae. The appeal was allowed.

BEAUTIFUL CEREMONY MARKS ORDINATION AT ST. ANDREW'S Rev. Hugh McFarlane, B.A., Officially Declared a Minister.

The Presbytery of London met in St. Andrew's Church Thursday evening for the public ordination and installation of the Rev. Hugh McFarlane, B.A., assistant to Dr. Ross. There was a large congregation present, and the choir under Mr. Wheeler's leadership provided appropriate music.

Rev. Dr. D. L. McCrae, of the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church, conducted divine service. Dr. McCrae's sermon on "The True Vision of God" was recognized on all hands as a noble and worthy of the great occasion. It made a deep impression on the large congregation, and was listened to throughout with rapt attention.

Impressive Ceremony. Moderator of Presbytery, Dr. MacKay, presented the candidate to the assembly, and these being answered to the satisfaction of the presbytery, the young minister knelt in front of the altar and Dr. Ross offered a very touching and earnest ordination prayer, during which the candidate was solemnly ordained by the laying on of the hands of the presbytery. The whole ceremony was very beautiful and impressive, as all the members of the presbytery gathered round the kneeling brother and placed their hands upon his head. On rising, Mr. McFarlane received the right hand of fellowship from the presbytery, and his name was entered on the roll.

Eloquent Address. The Rev. T. H. Mitchell, of New St. James' Church, gave a very eloquent and practical address to the newly-ordained minister, and Rev. N. H. MacGillivray, of St. Thomas, spoke words of weight and wisdom to the people. At the close of the service, Dr. Ross and Mr. C. R. Somerville introduced Mr. McFarlane to his new congregation as they passed out of the church. Mr. McFarlane begins his work under very happy auspices, and with the best wishes of the presbytery of London for his success. St. Andrew's people were greatly interested in the whole service, as an ordination service has not been held in that church for many years.

PRESIDENT WOOD ALLEGED TO BE BOMB PLANTER

Checks and Vouchers for Payments Made During Strike Shown in Court.

Charges Are That Dynamite Was Deliberately Placed in the Strikers' Homes.

[Canadian Press.] Boston, May 23.—Checks and vouchers, showing payments made by the American Woolen Company to Frederick E. Atteaux, including \$505, "for expenses incurred during the Lawrence strike," were introduced by the state at the trial today of President Wm. M. Wood, of the American Woolen Company, Atteaux, and Dennis J. Collins, who are accused of having "planted" dynamite in Lawrence during the textile strike in January, 1912.

The vouchers indicated that the payments were authorized by President Wood. The check for \$505 was drawn on March 1, 1912. Another check for \$2,190 was drawn on June 26, 1912, and the voucher for this was marked "in full for all claims to date." Both the checks were indorsed with Atteaux's name.

Deliberately Planned. The exhibits were offered in support of the Government's claim that the defendants conspired with John J. Breen and Ernest W. Pitman to "plant" dynamite in the homes of the strikers at Lawrence, Mass., and to give the impression to the public that the strikers contemplated blowing up the American Woolen Company's mill.

Pitman admitted that when the investigation of the alleged plot began, Collins turned state's evidence and confessed that he distributed the dynamite under the direction of Breen, from Pitman, and that Atteaux paid the bills. Wm. H. Rice, a quarryman, testified that he innocently furnished dynamite to Pitman and saw him give it to Breen.

Today the state attempted to show that President Wood was involved and that the American Woolen Company, through Wood, had helped pay the expenses of the conspiracy.

Wars in Chinatown Ended By Agreement

Feuds Have Cost Over Twenty Lives in Past Two Years.

New York, May 23.—"The tranquility of the Chinese colony shall hereafter be inviolate" according to large red posters conspicuous in Chinatown today announcing again that the rival gangs have arrived at "a brotherly agreement" dating from the twenty-first day of the fifth month, in the second year of the glorious republic.

The peace pact, which terminates feuds which have cost more than 20 lives of Chinese here during the past two years, was followed yesterday by a closing up of firearms during which many Chinese threw their modern revolvers into the sewers. The proclamation of peace praises the "good offices" of Luan Fang, consul general for the Republic government at the port of New York, and the kind advice of Charles S. Whitman, district attorney of New York County.

VETERANS READY IF CALLED FOR SERVICE

Mounted Police Association Held Its First Meeting at Vancouver.

Vancouver, B. C., May 23.—A wire has been sent to H. H. Stevens, M. P., advising him that the Mounted Police Veterans' Association, recently formed, having for one of its primary objects the promotion of imperialism, holds itself as a body at the service of the Government of Canada if called upon for service.

The association consists of 150 members, established with a view to holding time-expired men together to form a bond of unity between past and present members of this historic corps. The first regular meeting of the association was held here last night.

STOPPED THE WIRE

Venezuelans Will Give Out Nothing Regarding Arrests Made.

New York, May 23.—Venezuelan Government officials yesterday held a telegraphic conference with the Associated Press at Caracas, Venezuela, requesting details of the arrest of many Venezuelans there and of the reasons for the flight of Dr. Leopoldo Bapista, former secretary-general to President Gomez, and of Gen. Juan Pablo Penabaz, from the Venezuelan capital to Caracas, where they arrived in a small sailing boat Wednesday.

GUN EXPLODED

Three Killed and Nine Hurt in Charleston Accident.

[Canadian Press.] Charleston, W. Va., May 23.—A board of inquiry has been appointed to investigate the cause of the explosion last night at Battery Ford, Fort Moultrie, which killed three artillerymen, probably fatally wounding Capt. Hanna, sixteen company, Coast Artillery Corps, and injured nine privates.

Col. Strong, commanding district officer, is at a loss to account for the explosion's cause. The plunger of the gun pointed the roof of a vacant dwelling 400 feet away.

Capt. Hanna's condition is critical.

BIG COAL DEAL

Canadian Pacific To Take Entire Output of Hillcrest Mines.

Montreal, May 23.—Directors of the Hillcrest collieries, at a meeting held this week, ratified a contract for the sale of the entire output of the mines for a period of five years. The contract was entered into with the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has been taking about a third of the output for some time back, and was made at a satisfactory advance in selling price.

Blew Up Mountain To Save a Village

Big Peak Threatened to Fall and Kill Many People.

Aix-Les-Bains, France, May 23.—After living for twenty years in the shadow of impending disaster, the villages of Thorey, near here, have at last obtained peace of mind. The mountain peak of 3,000 feet high, whose base had been continually disintegrating and threatening to engulf the village, three hundred holes were bored in the side of the mountain, some of them 9 yards deep, and in or twelve pounds of dynamite were inserted in each hole. Before the fuse was fired the village was vacated, and from a distance the inhabitants witnessed the rock battle with nature.

The mountain was completely destroyed and no part of the village was damaged.

FUMES INTOXICATED TORONTO FIREMEN

Burning Shavings Made Heads and Legs Decidedly Unsteady.

Toronto, May 23.—Six men got intoxicated at a fire at Hancock's planing mill today from fumes from burning shavings. It was a case of "wood aneurism," and the symptoms were almost precisely those shown by a man who has been drinking heavily. The firemen lost control of their legs, suffered severely from "heads," and some of them were sick.

THREE-DAY STOP

Businessmen of Chicago Plan to Have a Big Holiday.

Chicago, Ill., May 23.—A movement was started yesterday by the Clearing House Association practically to stop the wheels of business in the city for three successive days, beginning Friday, July 4 and ending Sunday night, July 6. Banks in the association agreed to close on Saturday, July 5. The Chicago Board of Trade and the Chicago Stock Exchange probably will not open on Saturday, always a short day. Officials of the association have appealed to the board of directors of the Association of Commerce, and if the plan meets the approval of that body it is believed that all the larger business houses will remain closed on July 5, giving employees three days' rest.

CRASH ON C. P. R.

Overseas Mail Train Collided With Freight at Chesterville.

Smith's Falls, Ont., May 23.—The Canadian Pacific Railway special overseas mail train on its transcontinental trip, running at a high rate of speed, caught one of the Expresses at Quebec, crashed into a way freight standing on the main line at Chesterville yesterday. The two locomotives were smashed, and several cars demolished. The brakeman Vincent MacDonald, of the Brakesman Vincent MacDonald, of the special, was flung to the station platform and injured about the back and head. He was brought to the public hospital here, and is receiving attention. The wrecking crew were sent from here to clear the line. Others of the crew had miraculous escapes.
