

Blew Up Mountain To Save a Village

Aix-Les-Bains, France, May 23.—After iving for twenty years in the shadow of mpending disaster, the villagers of Thorman at last obtained impending disaster, the villagers of Thormery, near here, have at last obtained peace of mind.
