

# Woodstock Collegiate Medium of Technical Squad's Second Victory

## SLASHING 4TH QUARTER FOLLOWS LISTLESS MIX

### FIRST GAME OF CUP TIE FINALS HAS BOARDS TODAY

Game Full of Fumbles and Half-Hearted Bucks, Gave Way To Some Real Last-Quarter Rugby.

London Technical School won their second game in the Oxford and Middlesex Rugby Union when they defeated the Woodstock Collegiate team at Tecumseh Park Friday afternoon, 12 to 6. The game was listless until the last quarter when both teams put their all into the game. Captain Geo. Loveless, Phil Birch, Appleford and "Soup" Uppergrove played a splendid game. King and McMillan for the visitors featured in several of Woodstock's good plays. Both teams fumbled the ball considerably, and this helped to slow up play.

During the first four minutes of play Woodstock bucked their way into the five yards of London's five, but lost the ball when they attempted to make a rouse. London let the ball go, and when they were back in the line, they were in Woodstock's first down when they kicked over London's line. Capt. Loveless was playing for the kick, but fumbled the ball and Woodstock got their only touchdown. London got a rouse after two minutes of the second quarter had elapsed.

From the time Woodstock scored until five minutes of the third quarter had passed, neither team played good rugby. Woodstock's bucks were poor, and London failed to gain very much on their attempts at the same game.

**This Started Things.** Appleford started things humming in the third quarter when he carried the ball from the centre of the field to within ten yards of Woodstock's line. It was a splendid run, and he went through practically the whole of the visiting line. In the formation, following, Cusack kicked for a rouse, but the ball was returned. Appleford took the ball and made a side run for Woodstock's line, but was stopped when almost over. Loveless, Birch and Appleford formed a bucking line and put the ball over for the locals' first touchdown.

Life seemed to spring up in the London team after this. Capt. Loveless made a 75-yard run and put aside the whole forward line of Woodstock's team in doing so. He was stunned slightly when stopped, but he soon good tackling after this and kept it up until the game finished.

**Still More Lively.** When the third quarter ended London was stationed within fifteen yards of Woodstock's line. Loveless kicked for a rouse. Birch followed the ball and was jarred from his hands. Birch dove for the ball and hugged it tight for a moment. As an "eleventh hour" play, Woodstock forced their way towards London's line, and McMillan kicked over a rouse.

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BRITISH GOLF STYLE CONSISTENCY ITSELF

George Duncan and Abe Mitchell, the great English golfing pros, are going home. Their footprints on the greens of American show what is meant by consistent English golf.

Their games were no exhibition, nothing tricky, there was no holing out in one on a 400-yard fairway with the eyes shut, there was nothing but GOLF, the kind of golf that only English knows.

They played 165 rounds, crowding it into 96 days, traveled many thousands miles and in that short time exchanged putts with the greatest of our amateurs and professionals for fifty-two victories and seventeen defeats.

**Record Broken.** It is true that Ted Ray and Harry Vardon, in their driving tour of America last year, piled up an imposing score for 18-hole matches, but this average cannot be pitted against the consistency of the late tourists, who played their games in 36 holes.

The superior quality of golf by this famous team has left broken records on eight courses and in the fifty-two matches they have individual scores of 70 or better. Duncan's grand average for the trip was 72.16 against 72.19 of Mitchell's. On more than fourteen courses they equalled the club records. This swinging record of the Britons has never been equalled on either side of the water.

Their first feat on reaching America was to defeat Hutchins and their only defeat was at the hands of amateurs. Duncan, who played here last year, was surprised by the great stride the Americans could make in perfecting courses in a single year.

"American courses," said Duncan, "are getting nearer every year to the ones of England, in the perfecting of the fairways and greens, and my only objection is to the abundance of some of the courses. They lack in traps and bunkers to make the game a little more interesting."
