## SIR ADAM DENIES ENGLISH RUMORS

London Member Declares the Reports From Overseas Premature.

### SAILING HOME SOON

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, July 31.—A special cable from London to a Toronto newspaper today says: "Sir Adam Beck, who returned yesterday from the country, stated in an interview that reports that he would stay in England in the interests of the public ownership of electricity are premature. He added that the House of Commons yesterday mentioned the development of electricity as one of the palliatives of unemployment which the government intends to promote. He added that 'one of the greatest authorities in the world' is available to manage the project and it is understood that he meant Sir Adam Beck.

"Sir Adam, however, stated that his relations with the British government are confidential, but that nothing has yet been arranged. In any case he would do nothing without going to Canada first and consulting his colleagues, he said. 'The waste here and the opportunity of giving cheap power are so enormous that I am tempted to take up residence in England, particularly as my daughter has so many friends here,' he declared. 'However, nothing is decided and the power plan proposed here of subsidizing corporations is criminal as cheaply as our water if the right control is established.'

"Sir Adam is due to sail on Aug. 7, but may postpone his departure."

## GRAHAM SCORES SENATE FOR ATTITUDE ON C.N.R.

Declares Branch Lines Are Necessary—Urges Square Deal.

### RALLY AT TILBURY

Sinclair Raps Ferguson For Political Appointments in Ontario.

Special to The Advertiser. Tilbury, July 31.—Despite threatening weather, about five hundred Liberals from Essex and Kent Counties attended the rally in Prenevost Grove this afternoon. Ex-Mayor Sawyer officially opened the proceedings and made reference to the redistribution bill, which affects Essex County. Edward Teller, M.L.A. for North Essex, paid a stirring tribute to the late Hartley Dewar, and moved that a resolution of condolence be forwarded to Mr. Dewar's family. Hon. W. E. N. Sinclair seconded the resolution, and testified the sterling worth of the late Liberal leader.

When Hon. Mr. Sinclair called for consolidated opposition to the Conservative party he was warmly applauded by his audience. He scored the Ferguson government for various political appointments and for its attitude of hostility to Chief Justice Latchford. In conclusion he proposed the return to power of the Liberal party at the next provincial election.

Hon. George P. Graham declared that while one could never tell when a Dominion election would come he saw no immediate need for a federal contest. In defending the Canadian National Railway Mr. Graham said the branch lines are as essential to the great central lines as the many tributaries are to the mighty St. Lawrence.

Scores the Senate. The minister of railways severely scored the Toronto Mail and Empire and accused its defence of the actions of the Conservative senators who rejected many of the branch lines. Mr. Graham, while definitely stating that he did not support total abolition of the senate, said that he believed the senators had been ill advised this year.

"All we ask for the Canadian National is a square deal. In years to come it will be an asset not a liability," said the railway minister, who closed his remarks with an appeal for national unity among all classes in the Dominion.

Senator A. B. McCoig of Chatham paid a high compliment to Hon. Mr. Graham, heralding him as one of the most capable followers of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Senator McCoig announced that he opposed to the bill in favour of Senate reform. He advocated drastic economy.

A. P. Healy, M.P. for North Essex, dealt at length with the Home Bank situation, and prophesied speedy compensation for the depositors, and severely criticized Sir Thomas White for his actions in the Home Bank case. He emphasized that he believed there would be no election this fall.

Aurelien Belanger, M.L.A. of Russell, and Severin Ducharme, ex-M.L.A. for North Essex, made brief addresses in favour of the Liberal Division.

Credit for the success of the picnic is due to Dr. Rochon and E. G. Odette, who was chairman of the gathering.

## ALDERMAN HUSHION NAMED IN BY-ELECTION

Will Stand As Liberal Candidate For St. Antoine Division.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, July 31.—Alderman W. J. Hushion, M.L.A. for St. Antoine's division, is to be the Liberal candidate in St. Antoine division, it was announced officially here tonight. Mr. Hushion is at present absent from the city, but it was stated at Liberal headquarters on his behalf that he would shortly issue an official statement.

Registration so far in the division has been very quiet, fewer than 50 votes having been registered in the first two days since the polls were opened.

## Town Deserted As Fire Closes On Three Sides

Special to The Advertiser. San Francisco, July 31.—With a wall of flame on two sides and rapidly closing the gap on the third side, the town of Floriston, in the Truckee canyon, was reported deserted today as its 250 inhabitants fled before the advancing forest fire with their portable belongings.

Only a fortunate change of wind was expected to save the 45 cottages making up the little paper mill town.

Forest fires were burning from the Klamath national forest on the north to the San Jacinto mountains on the south, according to reports to the U. S. forestry service.

Two lives have been lost to date.

## ST. MARYS MAN HELD FOR ARSON

James B. White Arrested by Provincial Police After Second Investigation.

Special to The Advertiser. St. Marys, July 31.—James B. White was arrested this afternoon by Inspector Boyd and Provincial Officer Kirby on a charge of arson, and has been taken to Stratford, where he will face the charge before Magistrate Makins.

The arrest was an echo of the burning of the barns owned by Dr. P. T. Coupland, on Coupland Heights, on June 7, when six horses and some wagon equipment belonging to White and some golf course equipment belonging to Dr. Coupland were burned in a fire which totally destroyed the buildings.

Following the fire, statements were made by Charles O'Hara which resulted in an investigation by Fire Marshal Heaton of Toronto. At the hearing O'Hara alleged that Dr. Coupland had approached him offering money if the barns were burned. White was among the witnesses at the hearing, and told of leaving everything in a safe condition when he left the buildings shortly before the fire was discovered.

Fire Marshal Heaton rendered a decision in which he absolutely cleared Dr. Coupland of the allegations of O'Hara, while he styled as a malicious attempt to injure Dr. Coupland. Following this decision the claims for insurance were settled by the insuring companies.

The later investigation, which has covered a period of several days, was ordered by Attorney-General Nickle following complaints made to him on behalf of several citizens who were not satisfied that the decision of the fire marshal was correct.

Cattle Starved To Death In Trap. Nine Animals Accidentally Locked in Disused Building.

Canadian Press Despatch. Peterboro, July 31.—Nine head of cattle have just been found starved to death in a building on a ranch in Dummer Township. They were the property of W. T. and Edgar Buck. The nine head of three-year-old stock had been turned out on the ranch on the eighth line of Dummer Township. They by some means got into an old disused building, and the door became closed. The imprisoned animals slowly starved to death.

The odor of decayed flesh first drew attention to the fate of the beasts.

1,000 PEARL IN CLAM.

Canadian Press Despatch. Moncton, July 31.—Mrs. Clifford Moller of this city, in opening a clam in her home, found a large sized black pearl, the value of which is placed at \$1,000.

## TWO ARE KILLED AT LEVEL CROSSING

Third Such Accident Occurs in Central Ontario in As Many Days.

Canadian Press Despatch. Milton, July 31.—In the third fatal level crossing accident in Central Ontario in three days, Alfred H. Terrill and his aged father, James N. Terrill, were instantly killed at Anderson's crossing on the Second Line, Trafalgar, west of Milton, this evening when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by an eastbound Canadian Pacific passenger train.

According to Oliver Pearson, who witnessed the accident from the tower at the C. N. R. and C. P. R. diamond, about 150 yards west of the crossing, the unfortunate men were coming east toward Milton in a roadster at about 15 miles an hour. As the car approached the crossing, which is double-tracked, the westbound C. P. R. express, known as "The Canadian," went by, evidently cutting off the sight of the eastbound train.

As Mr. Terrill, still travelling at 15 miles an hour, went to cross behind the westbound train his car was struck by the oncoming eastbound express and hurled about 50 feet. The bodies of father and son were picked up 50 feet farther on at the bottom of a steep embankment. The car was a total wreck, and the bodies of the victims were badly mangled, their faces being mutilated almost beyond recognition.

Coroner H. A. McCall of Milton will conduct an inquest at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

EVIDENCES OF SUICIDE CONSIDERED AMPLE. Couple Had Pinned Coats Together Before Jumping Into Canal.

Canadian Press Despatch. Peterboro, July 31.—That Coroner Young in his decision not to hold an inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. Joseph Sharpe and Samuel Taylor is justified by the ample evidence of suicide on the part of both.

Before jumping into the water on Sunday night they had put on their heavy coats. These they pinned together at the top and bottom with horse blanket safety pins about three inches long. They used the pins to fasten their coats together and prevent them from being separated in the water.

After pinning themselves fast, they evidently embraced each other and jumped into the canal and sank in about ten feet. They used the pins were used both at the bottom and top on both sides of their coats, about four inches from the bottom and just below the arms.

The funeral of Mrs. Sharpe took place from the home of her brother, Robert Matchette, at 11 o'clock today. At 2 o'clock Rev. W. Harold Young of the Methodist Church conducted the services at Samuel Taylor's funeral. Both funerals were private.
