

## STRATFORD PLANS OUTLAY ON PARKS

Council Authorizes Issue of Debentures For Twenty Thousand Dollars.

Stratford, July 20.—A bylaw authorizing the issue of debentures for \$20,000, covering capital expenditure of the parks board, was passed by the city council tonight. The council decided to hold elections on the first Monday in January as usual, and the advance poll has been reduced to two days instead of three. Charges for service of the fire department outside the city limits were approved as follows: Minimum charge \$50; \$100 for first hour, \$50 second hour and \$25 each succeeding hour which department is engaged.

Miss Eva Bowles was appointed acting city treasurer until a successor to the late City Treasurer Lawrence is appointed. A resolution expressing regret at the death of the city treasurer was passed and the council will attend the funeral in a body.

## Pear Tree Near Lambeth Bears Fruit At 114 Years

Lambeth, July 16.—A pear tree 114 years old, a woman who lived to be over 100 years old, and a grandson now 90 years old, are interesting facts in connection with the farm owned by Joseph Poole, Lambeth, Ont.

Mr. Poole bought the farm in the year 1871 from David Patrick, with whom he lived for the year. Mr. Patrick's mother, Mrs. Abraham Patrick, who lived with him, one day called Mr. Poole's attention to a tree by saying: "I planted that pear tree over 60 years ago." Mrs. Patrick was then 100 years of age. When Mr. Poole took possession of the place at the end of the year she moved with her son to the farm, just north of Lambeth village, now owned by John Ellice, where she died in her 101st year.

The pear tree is at least 114 years old, and Mr. Poole says that during the 54 years he has owned the farm there has never failed to be both blossoms and fruit on it. The present year promises to be no exception, for during the blossom season the heavy bloom gave the branches the appearance of being covered with snow.

The tree stands a short distance from the site of the original house and about fifty feet from the edge of the high bank overlooking the flats of Dingman's creek, where it is crossed by the Longwoods road, just west of the village of Lambeth. The deep pools on either side of the bridge are favorite fishing places. The winding creek, with its bordering willows, the green flats and graceful elms, the high banks, the bridge and the white paved road combine to make this one of the beauty spots along this part of the provincial highway.

Eber Patrick of Lambeth is a grandson of the late Mrs. Abraham Patrick. He is now over 30 years of age. Although he and Mrs. Patrick have been in failing health for some time they still cling to their habit of early rising and are interested in the affairs of the neighborhood. On fine mornings Mr. Patrick may be seen working in his garden or taking a walk around the village, stopping here and there for a friendly chat with some of his many friends.

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## BRITISH FINANCIAL HELP FOR ONTARIO

Premier Ferguson Declares English Loan Houses All Friendly To Canada.

London, July 20.—"I have been in touch with many big financial houses here, and without exception, I have found them all entirely friendly towards Canada, particularly Ontario," said Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, premier of Ontario, to the Canadian Press, today.

"We can of course borrow money cheaper just now in New York than in London," Premier Ferguson continued, "but they tell me here that the currency is likely to be stabilized in the course of six or eight months, after which there should be every opportunity for sound industrial propositions in Ontario getting capital readily from London."

Legislation Appreciated.  
Premier Ferguson said he had found considerable appreciation here of recent Ontario legislation whereby English financial and commercial interests could nominate Canadians to represent them on the spot with practically full powers of directors. This, he said, in the course of time, would lead to a change in the method usually followed by British promoters who did not always realize the necessity for having expert Canadian brains and energy to work Canadian propositions.

Another matter to which Premier Ferguson has given some attention is the migration of youths of a superior class for training as farmers. "We want a good grade of boy," he said, "who, after a few years' training will be able to take up a holding on his own account, with, perhaps, some help from his parents at home. The overseas settlement committee is helping towards boy emigration of a general class on a 50-50 basis, but at the present time this scheme fails to reach the class of youths that we are most anxious to get in touch with."

New Scheme Likely.  
"I had a two hours' talk with the secretary of the overseas settlement committee today, and it is possible that some new scheme may develop which will prove attractive to lads who, if they make good, will command a little capital."

With reference to alleged unfriendly criticism of Canada in the British press, Premier Ferguson said: "Most of it arises simply from the fact that we do not get proper publicity here. When I pick up an English first-class paper I find a page devoted to foreign and Dominion affairs, while only a few paragraphs relate to Canada. The Canadian pages often carry only meagre information concerning affairs in the Dominion of Canada. We could get a much better showing if this matter were followed up properly. I shall look into it further."

Premier Ferguson intends to go to Scotland early in August, and sail for home on August 8.
