THE JEFFERSONS IN "THE RIVALS."

Delightful Comedy Presented at the Grand Opera House Last Night.

It was an unfortunate fact that one of the smallest audiences of the season should have been present at the Grand Opera House last evening to see the Jeffersons in "The Rivals." It was unfortunate for two reasons: first, because a great many people missed a very delightful evening's entertainment, and secondly, that London should have not failed to extend a more liberal welcome to so talented a company. "The Rivals" is a delicious bit of comedy, sparkling with wit and humor. It has a pretty plot, and avoids the introduction of an objectionable character of any description. The auditor is led to hope that every one may succeed in his or her purpose, with the possible exception of Mrs. Malaprop, so excellently characterized by Miss Follitt. Puget, Joseph Jefferson, Jr., was seen here in the old Grand Opera House in "Rip Van Winkle," and, oddly enough, his former play is following him closely appearing here on New Year's Day. In the part of "Sir Lucius O'Trigger," Mr. Jefferson left little to be desired, while as Bob Acres, whose courage was a somewhat doubtful quantity, Mr. Wm. W. Jefferson gave a finished interpretation. Mr. John Jack, in the role of Sir Anthony, has a ponderous physical development that stands him in good stead in this character, at least. Mr. Guy Combs had the part of "Captain Absolute," with a name of the plume of "Deverry," and Percy Puckett appeared as "David." Miss Blanche Bender, as "Lydia," and Miss Aileen Goodwin, as "Lucy," presented a pleasing personality. Miss Goodwin being a particularly bright comedienne, though having a somewhat unimportant part. Altogether the company was exceptionally well balanced, and their production of "The Rivals" will linger in the memory of those who witnessed it as one of the best comedy hits of the season.

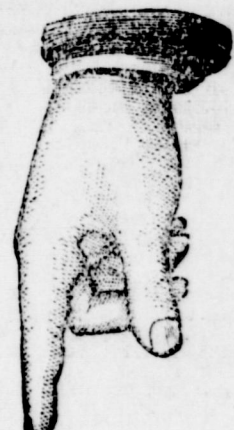
