## Europe.

**LONDON.**, Dec 29.—Sir Stafford Northcote has succeeded the Earl of Kimberley as Governor of the Hudson Bay Company. It is the general impression that the Conservatives will be successful in the elections for members of Parliament to fill the vacancies. The new House of Commons met yesterday for preliminary business. Only eight Ministers who are elected took the oath of office; while were issued for election to fill the vacancies, after which the House adjourned till the 26th of February.

**LONDON.**, Dec 29.—Raverty Johnson, in a speech yesterday, said the naturalization treaty between the United States and Great Britain is certain of ratification by the United States Senate. The treaty provides that British subjects who have been naturalized in the United States shall have the same rights and protection on their return to Great Britain as native born Americans.

**MADRID.**, Dec 29.—For the purpose of reducing the budget of the coming year, the suspension of thirty-seven of the Captain-Generalships and Bishoprics have been suggested. The Government will despatch 10,000 soldiers to Cuba and Porto Rico during January.

**VIENNA.**, Dec 29.—The Press says the Greek Government is ready to comply with the recent demands made by Turkey, supported by the Great Powers of Europe.

**LONDON.**, Dec 29.—The house of Bremer & Co., heavy dealers in, and manufacturers of cotton, suspended yesterday. They had extensive connections in America.

**LONDON.**, Dec 29.—The Morning Post publishes a correspondence between Jas. G. Bennett, Jr. and Ash Burley, of London, relating to an ocean yacht race between the Dauntless and Cambria. **VIENNA.**, Dec 29.—The Greeks are fierce, from Turkey, on account of threatened war. Several families of fugitives have been received by the people of Romania. They have been warned, however, that they must preserve absolute neutrality in case of war, on pain of expulsion.

**LONDON.**, Dec 29.—A letter from Montevideo says that President Lopez is prepared to give full satisfaction to the United States for the wrongs suffered by American citizens.

**PARIS.**, Dec 29.—The Spanish Government publishes in a gazette the account of the battle of Moran. Among the baggage captured from the insurgents were several jars of strichine, eight hundred filibusters have landed at the bay of Cochitas and Santiago. The Government has ready 1800 troops to that part of the island. They are surrounded by 10,000 insurgents. 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The Porte has extended the term for the departure of the Greeks from the Turkish dominions to five weeks. France and England have little sympathy with the proposed Conference. It is arranged that the Conference of the Great Powers will assemble in Paris early in January.

**MADRID.**, Dec 29.—The Duke de Montpensier abdicates in favor of a man who suggests the nomination of a candidate Duke de Montpensier for King under a regency.

Semi-official journals say that Spain will not even consider the subject of the sale of Cuba to the United States. Troops have sailed for Cuba.

**Eastern States.**

New York, Dec 28.—The Evening Post has a report that Caleb Cushing was sent to Bogota with full power from the Government to enter into contract for building a ship canal across the Isthmus, towards which it is said our Government is ready to promise and guarantee a million dollars. Gen. Grant is warmly in favor of the scheme. Cushing is convinced that the canal must be built at or very near the line of the Panama rail road.

## California.

**SAN FRANCISCO.**, Dec 30.—A grand banquet was given in New York last night in honor of Professor Morse, of the Magnetic Telegraph. An instrument in the hall was placed in communication with San Francisco, and messages were sent direct between the two cities. ## DELAYED DISPATCHES.

### Eastern States.

**WASHINGTON.**, Dec 24.—The President has issued a full pardon and amnesty to all persons engaged directly or indirectly in the rebellion. The pardon includes Jeff Davis, Breckinridge, Thompson, Slidell, and all others who directly or indirectly engaged in the late rebellion.

### Europe.

**LONDON.**, Dec. 20.—Gladstone, Bright and Lowe, and all the members of Parliament appointed to positions under the Government, have been returned, except Cardwell, whose election takes place tomorrow. None of the elections were contested. It is generally believed that the ministerial change in France is due to the influence of the anti-clerical free press.

**Gladstone.**, in a speech at the hustings in Greenwich, said that he was not wholly in favor of the ballot box, but that if free voting was impossible without such a safeguard, then he was for the ballot.

**Bright** also made a speech before the re-election at Birmingham, in which he explained that he had declined his first appointment as Secretary for India, because the labor of that office was too severe for him in his present state of health, and also because he thought the views of the country in regard to his policy were not sufficiently advanced.
