GLENER GETS THE LION'S SHARE

Was Paid \$1,854 for Printing One Report-Grimmer Introduces Amendment to Game Laws.

MANY QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

Petitions were presented by Hon. Mr. Maxwell in favor of a bill to amend the St. John's Assessment Act; by Mr. Byrne for incorporation of the Bathurst Station and Carling Company; and to authorize the municipality of Gloucester to make a temporary loan of \$5,000.

Notices of inquiry were given by Mr. Lowell respecting the action of the present last department in connection with the forest fire last fall at Ladgate Lake; by Hon. Mr. LaBelle, about the bridge at the 24th inst. at Fredericton Junction; by Mr. Byrne about Millstream Marsh bridge; by Mr. LaBelle about the damage done to the highway at Dal River by cascading gales.

Hon. Mr. Burroughs gave notice of a motion that in the opinion of the house immediate steps should be taken regarding the Grand Trunk Pacific to operate its railway through the forest lands of New Brunswick by electric power generated at Grand Falls.

Hon. Mr. Pennington in reply to Mr. McKinnon's inquiry said—

Q.—Is the Government paying for the printing of the reports of the various departments according to the schedule of prices in force under the late Government? If not, has a new schedule of prices for printing reports been adopted by the Government and if so, what is the schedule now in force?

Ans.—The Government is not paying for printing of the reports of the various departments, according to the schedule of prices in force under the late Government. New tenders for printing the same were asked for on the 19th of December last and a new schedule is now in force as follows:—

Q.—If no schedule for such printing has been adopted, upon what basis is the printing of the reports of the various departments paid?

Ans.—By No. 1.

Q.—What amount if any, has been paid on account of printing since the 1st of January 1909?

Ans.—The amounts paid for the reports for year 1908 are as follows:—

The total cost for printing the several reports for the year 1908 amounted to \$4,463.73, making a saving in the cost for 1908 of \$599.98.

Q.—How much per hundred is paid for printing covers for such reports, and how much for binding each report?

Ans.—Covers cost \$5 per 1000 and binding from \$25 to \$30 per 1000, excepting the agricultural report at \$50 per 1000.

Q.—Does the same basis prevail for payment of other government printing as is in force for the printing of the departmental reports? If not, upon what basis is other printing paid?

Ans.—The same basis, as near as possible, is followed for printing in other cases.

Mr. Hazen in reply to Mr. Lowell's inquiry, said—

Q.—Has any claim been put to the government for compensation for printing?

Ans.—No.

ARBITRATION HAD BEEN POSTPONED

Mr. Malcolm Went to St. John and Was Not Notified.

SPRING WORK SOON.

Thomas Malcolm, of Campbellton, the contractor for the International Railway, arrived in the city yesterday to attend the sitting of the commission in connection with the arbitration proceedings with the New Brunswick Railway Company. He had been aware that the hearing had been postponed until the 25th inst. and to a Telegram reporter expressed himself as much annoyed at the delay. He attributed the postponement to the action of the railway company, and said it would be for the last time.

Speaking of the progress being made on the railway, Mr. Malcolm said all work for the season would be started next week. He expected to have the road ready for traffic in August. The weather conditions, he added, were already very favorable, the thermometer registering 70 degrees in the shade at Campbellton two days ago—Telegram.

MURDER VICTIM A QUEBEC FARMER

Riddled With Buckshot in Front of Stable Door—No Clue to Assassin.

HAD NO ENEMIES.

ST. ETIENNE DE BEAUCHAMPEL, April 14—An apparently cold blooded murder was discovered here yesterday evening when the body of Duncan Pelletier was discovered lying outside the stable door with part of his head blown off, and the door splattered with buckshot. Pelletier had been dead for many hours when discovered, and it is thought the murder must have been committed early on Tuesday morning, when he had returned to his farm from staying with relatives four miles away. The body was discovered by a neighbor, Wilfred Gendron, who was surprised at seeing no one about the place and walked over to see if anything was wrong. He found Pelletier's body lying cold and stiff beside the stable door. A further examination showed the marks of buckshot in the stable door while in the door of the barn about thirty feet distant, a small hole had been freshly cut, through which it was evident the murderer had pushed the barrel of his gun. Just outside the hole was found a freshly fired shell from a shotgun.

The coroner at Val-des-Ruys was notified of the crime and arrived here this evening, but so far, although he has been assisted by the provincial detectives from Montreal and the sheriff, due to the identity of the murderer has been discovered, nor any motive for the crime, as there was no evidence of robbery. While Pelletier was a very peaceful man, well liked by his neighbors, and without any known enemies.
