CAMPAIGN FOR SAFE MILK

The most important factor in child welfare work, the one that every citizen should be interested in, is a Safe Milk Supply.

Milk is the food of infants and young children; it contains all the elements of a well balanced diet even for adults.

In comparison to its food value, the cost of milk is far below that of any other food:

1 quart of Milk—3 lbs. beef, 3 lbs. fresh codfish, 2 lbs. Potatoes, 1-3 lb. cheese, 1-6 lb. butter, 1-3 lb. wheat flour and eight eggs.

1 Glass of Milk:—1 large serving of meat, 2 potatoes, 5 tablespoons cooked cereal, 3 tablespoons boiled rice, 2 slices bread, 2 eggs.

1 quart milk costs 15c—8 eggs costing 30c to 50c.

For the benefit of the child and for economy use more milk.

But—all foodstuffs of animal origin, milk is the most difficult to obtain, handle, transport and deliver in a clean, fresh and satisfactory condition.

Dirt and bacteria have so many opportunities of getting into milk; the bacteria will increase in numbers so rapidly if milk is not kept cold or if it is too old; and these bacteria may easily produce disease and death, therefore we must have careful inspection of cattle, methods of production, conveyance and delivery to ensure clean milk and milk that has not been tampered with or robbed of its nutriment.

But even clean milk may have been contaminated with disease germs such as Tuberculosis from the cow; Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Septic Sore Throat from the workers; Typhoid or the Intestinal Diseases of children from polluted water used in washing utensils or improperly cleaned cans, etc.

There are some of the dangers that inspectors cannot see.

How can they be guarded against?

By Pasteurization.

What is Pasteurization?

Heating milk just sufficiently to kill off disease and other harmful germs that may have gotten into it.

Pasteurization does not change the composition of milk.

It is not a substitute for care and cleanliness.

It does not make dirty milk clean or old milk new.

But it makes MILK SAFE.

For the sake of the children, all milk supplied to towns or cities should be pasteurized and bottled under careful official supervision.

FINE "GRIDIRON" AT COBLENZ

American Soldiers Stationed There Have Facilities for Almost Every Kind of Sport

Elaborate preparations were made at Coblenz, Germany, for the football season. Grounds and stadium which were only partly finished a year ago have been made permanent playing fields, and many of them compare favorably with the best college gridirons in the United States.

The most elaborately finished ground is in Coblenz, known as "Carnival Island." It was on this ground that the Third Army championships were decided last season, but the ground that time was not in as good condition as it is today. Neither were there proper facilities, such as dressing rooms.

At this island there are now two regular baseball fields, two football fields, a golf course of nine holes, a polo ground, a quarter-mile cinder track, with 220 yard straightaway, and outdoor basketball courts. On another part is a ring for horse shows and nine tennis courts.

Suitable bleachers to accommodate 5,000 spectators have been built, and there also are a large number of properly equipped dressing rooms with showers, rubbing tables and store rooms.

Not only at Coblenz are there grounds available for the soldiers, but at Andernach, Montabaur, and Neuwied the old grounds left by the A. E. F. have been taken over by the Y. M. C. A. and enlarged and remade in every particular.

Railway News

Vancouver. — The C. P. R. have taken the lead in employing the laborers in preference to Orientals, 66 men being sent to Revelstoke from the C. P. R. Western Division.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has made arrangements for the convenience of the travelling public where they may insure their baggage and personal effects while travelling by land or sea in any part of the world.

Policies cover the property of the insured against all risks of rail and water transportation, including theft and pilferage wherever the insured resides or is travelling.

Persons travelling may secure policies from the agents of the C. P. R. at the principal stations throughout Canada and the United States.

In addition the policies will be on sale in the baggage rooms at: Brandon, Man.; Brockville, Ont.; Calgary, Alta.; Edmonton, Alta.; Windsor, Ont.; Place Viger Station, Montreal; Moose Jaw, Sask.; Quebec Station and Wharf, Que.; Regina, Sask.; Toronto, Ont.; Vancouver Station and Wharf, B.C.; Winnipeg, Man.; and Fort William, Ont.

One hundred and sixty-six of the passengers aboard the Canadian Pacific liner "Montrose" on her maiden voyage from Liverpool to Montreal have addressed a letter to Mr. G. M. "We therefore beg to congratulate the Company on having such a steamer as the 'Montrose' added to its fleet, and ourselves on having had the privilege of taking part in its maiden voyage."

The first Trans-Canada C. P. R. train of the season left Windsor Street Station, Montreal, at 5 p.m. Sunday, May 21st, and left Toronto at 9 p.m. on the same day.

The splendid train, carrying standard sleeping car equipment only, and making the fastest time between terminals of any trans-continental train in America, leaves Montreal, Windsor Street Station at 5:00 p.m., and Toronto Union Station at 5:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time daily, consuming 68 hours between Toronto and Vancouver, and 27 hours between Montreal and Vancouver.

The schedule is so arranged that the train passes through all important points (commercial or tourist) at most convenient hours of morning or evening, and during the portion of the trip through the Canadian Rockies open observation cars from Field to Revelstoke are special features. There is no extra charge made for this feature by Canadian Pacific.

Although this is the only de-luxe train run in Canada in which sleeping car passengers only are carried, there is no extra fare required to travel on same.

With the resumption of the full summer trans-continental service the Canadian Pacific will have at 8:00 a.m. every day thirty-six trans-continental trains moving on its rails at various points between Montreal and Vancouver (28 dining cars are serving breakfast), among which are included eight "Trans-Canada" trains—of all this vast fleet of high class trains the Trans-Canada is the "Premier Train."

The Trans-Canada is in addition to the "Vancouver Express" now operating, making two trans-continental trains daily between Toronto and Vancouver. Travelling by the Trans-Canada a business day is made of the trip.

Special meals are served on the "Premier Train" and it is made for business travellers, third morning in Vancouver, the Canadian Pacific will this summer have four trans-continental trains each way every day over the mountains.

RIVER COLLISION AT NEWCASTLE

"Canadian Squatter" Headed Up Stream Kams Morrissey Draw Bridge

The draw in the Morrissey Bridge at Newcastle was badly damaged at about 6:15 Sunday evening when the C.M.M. vessel "Canadian Squatter" headed up river to load coal at Burnchild's mill, rammed into it before it could be swung open.

Larry Coulgan, the draw engineer, who was having supper at his home, a short distance below the bridge on the Nelson side, when the steamer's bow struck the bridge, was so shocked that he did not appear to be slackening speed and realizing the danger he shouted for them to stop and managed to get the traffic gates closed, but as several minutes were required to swing the big draw around he realized it was impossible to do so before the boat would be upon him so he ran out on the main part of the bridge and had just reached a point of safety when the immense steamer rammed the draw with such force that it lifted the heavy steel structure several feet in the air, clear of the turntable on which it revolves, and swung it around to an angle of about forty-five degrees.

The pilot aboard the boat realizing the danger too late, ordered the big anchor to be dropped but before the headway of the steamer could be checked it smashed bow on into the bridge.

The vessel suffered practically no damage and dropped down stream a short distance and anchored.

The entire draw of the bridge listed quite noticeably to the west, several of the steel binders badly twisted, and the planking torn up for some distance at the Newcastle end.

Traffic over the bridge is now entirely cut off for several weeks until wrecking machinery can be brought here and the draw lifted back into place.

It was reported late last night that the vessel would be loaded from coams which would necessitate a great deal of extra work.

This is the second time that an accident of this nature has taken place at Newcastle.
