A WHITE SUMMER, THIS DELIGHTFUL NEW SAILOR HATS OF SNOWY DUCK

Deck Yachting Frocks Made "Cool to the Touch of the Sunniest Hour"

Not Gowns for Ducks, but Ducks for Gowns for Girls.

Speaking of duck hats, says Harper's Bazar, recalls some perfect duck gowns made for a famous yachting woman.

The shops are filled with white duck suits, costing from a few dollars upwards, some with little lines in them, others very fine, pointed or broadened with silk, all cut after one plan, with a jacket and skirt to wear with a vest or shirt-waist.

Of course tailors delight in making these jackets and coats, such garments are their specialty; yet at Redfern's one sees the simplest gowns of white linen duck, not unlike fine glossy sheening, marked \$75, and made with a plain belted waist and a round skirt trimmed with the genuine navy-blue dungaree worn in a striped front. The lines are in a striped front and back to a wide belt of blue dungaree striped with white braid. The V-neck is filled in with a shield of the blue willow cotton, striped with cross rows of white braid, and there is a broad arched collar of the deep blue bordered with rows of white braid. The sleeves, all in one piece, of white linen, is very wide with a row of white braid below the elbow in lengthwise tufts to make it fit snugly in a blue dungaree cut trimmed with rows of white braid. The skirt, nearly four yards wide, is gathered to white silk belting, and is trimmed at the top with a row of white braid of the dark dungaree with three rows of dark blue braid.

ANOTHER ADVANCE IN WHEAT

WALL-STREET SCOURMISERS ARE VERY STRONG.

Increased Trading on the Local Stock Exchange—Receipts of Export Cattle Large Land Prices Firm—Selling Exchange Unchanged—Provisions Irregular at Chicago.

There was a better feeling in Canadian stock to-day and bank stocks as a rule are higher.

Canals are weaker, closing at 101 1/2 for money and at 101 1/8 for account.

Canadian Pacific is very weak, closing in London to-day at 65.

Three millions in gold have been engaged for shipment at New York to-morrow, making a total of \$6,150,000 for the week.

Bar silver in London is easier at 28 1/2 per ounce.

The bank clearings at Montreal this week amount to \$11,344,454, as compared with \$11,995,829 the corresponding week of last year.

The reserve fund of the Bank of England increased 236,000,000 this week and the proportion of reserve to liability is 68.72 per cent.

At Toronto call loans are quoted at 4 1/2 per cent, at Montreal 4 to 4 1/2 per cent, at London 1 1/2 to 2 1/4 and at New York 1 1/2 to 2 per cent. The Bank of England discount rate is 2 per cent, and the open market rate 1 1/2.
