Toronto Markets.

Toronto, June 6.—The presence of several Western buyers added to the usual local demand for butcher cattle, and active market for export to-day, the active butcher market to-day, and prices were easily 10c firmer than on Monday and about 25c higher than about a week ago. One load of choice export cattle fetched the top price of \$6.30 and there were several loads of good heavy cattle that sold over six cents per pound. There were no cattle bought for export to-day, everything being taken for butcher purposes. Several loads of well finished butcher cattle were sold for Winnipeg, where butcher cattle are scarce. Export buyers are not taking chances on the uncertain British market, leaving a clear field for the local consumers. Cows and bulls were firm, the former going as high as \$5.40. Milch cows were dull and very hard to sell. Feeders and stockers were easy and in fair demand. Canadian sheep and lambs were very cheap and the high prices were all fetched by American stock brought over from Buffalo. Hogs are 10c higher again. The run included 82 loads, 1,300 cattle, 608 sheep and lambs, 600 hogs and 254 calves.
