LARGE CARDS emphasizing three laws for the protection of childhood have been posted in town by the Council. These laws are as follows and will be enforced: iaws are as follows and will be enforced:
1.—No child under 16 years of age is permitted to be on the streets without a guardian after 9 p.m. 2. No child under 15 years unaccompanied by adults shall be permitted to attend any exhibition by Cinematograph, etc. This law is being evaded, but the persons so doing—such as pretending to take children in, are liable to a fine of not less than \$50. 3. It is a crime to directly or indirectly sell, give or furnish to any person under the age of 16, cigarettes or cigarette papers or tobacco in any form. The first offence is \$10, the second, \$25. These laws are made by our legislators to safeguard our children and are meant not to curtail their pleasures but only to keep them
