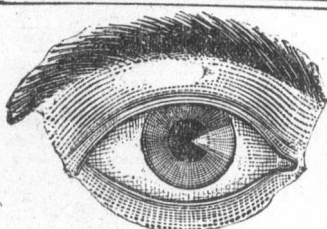

Twelve Gallons of Whisky at a Barn Raising

Malcolm McAlpine, who recently pur-
chased the A. S. McMillan farm, Crinan,
erected the frame for the barn 76x40 feet
in size on a 9-foot cement wall, last week.
The main portion of the frame was out
of the old barn erected on the farm 63
years ago, and torn down a short time
ago by Mr. McAlpine. The shingles on
the old barn were hand made, the timber
having been secured in the township of
Dunwich.

David Stuart, who is in his 92nd year,
helped make the shingles for the old
barn. Mr. Stuart was present at the
raising 63 years ago, and was also there
when the frame was again raised Friday.

The original shingles were taken off the
old barn by Mr. McAlpine. Mr. Stuart
says that at the first raising twelve gal-
lons of whiskey were used to keep up the
spirits of the men, while Friday only
water was supplied, and the quantity
consumed was considerably under twelve
gallons.
