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### BROOKE COUNCIL,

Inwood, Oct. 25, 1919. Council met pursuant to adjourn-ment. Members all present. Minutes of former meeting read and on motion of Sutton—Campbell were adopted

Communications: From Victory Loan Committee, Sarnia, requesting council to pass a resolution endorsing the Victory

Atkin-Loosemore, that this council endorse the Victory Loan as requested .- Carried.

In the matter of presentation of rings to soldiers, the attention of the Council has been called to the fact that some had received a ring that was not entitled to same, as it was not the intention of the council to present rings to any only Class A men.

Mr. Henry Swan made application for a loan of \$700.00 under the terms of "The Tile Drainage Act" with report from Tile Drain Inspector that he had completed 863 rods of tile

Mr. Roy Melton made application for a loan of \$800.00 under the "Tile Drainage Act," with a report from Inspector that he had completed 1000 rods of tile drains.

Sutton—Atkin, that applications be entertained and by-laws be pre-pared to impose a special drainage rate on the  $w_2$ , lot 1, con. 10, and east half of lot 2, concession 11, and Reeve authorized to issue debentures to the amount asked for .- Carried.

Mr. C. Atkins, commissioner in charge of repairs to the 4 and 5 con. drain opposite lots 7, 8 and 9 reported the work completed. Total expenditures \$1306.77; receipts by sale of tile \$1.25; assumed by County road \$300; leaving a balance \$1005.52 to be pro rata on lands and roads assessed under by-law No. 5 of 1917 as per agreement of rate-

Atkin-Loosemore, that report be adopted and by-law be prepared authorizing the issue of debentures to repay the amount advanced.-Carried.

Campbell-Sutton, that Davidson Drain bylaw be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

By-law submitted and read to authorize the construction of the Hustler drain and to borrow on the credit of the Township the sum of \$734.00 for completing the same.

Loosemore-Campbell, that by law be provisionally adopted, printed in pamphlet form with copy served on each person assessed with a Court of Revision on same be held in Code's Hall, Alvinston, on Saturday the 22nd day of November 1919, to open at 3 o'clock p.m. Commission ers to serve by-laws.—Carried.

By-law to impose a tile drainage rate upon s w 4 lot 6, con 13, was submitted and read.

Sutton—Campbell, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed. -Carried.

Atkin-Campbell, that Council do now adjourn to meet in Alvinston on Saturday the 22nd day of November.-Carried. W. J. WEED, Clerk.
