Con-sumption, or pulmonary tuberculosis, is in every case caused by disease germs which grow in the langs in enormous numbers. When a person is sick with this disease, these germs are coughed up in great quan-tities in the expectoration, and when this becomes dry and crumbles, or is trodden to dust, the germs float about in the air and are liable to be breathed into the lungs of are liable to be breathed into the lungs of any one. If the lungs of the person who does breathe them are poorly developed,

does breathe them are poorly developed, or if the constitution is feeble, the germs are very sure to grow and cause the disease. Unfortunately, we do not know how to kill them when they are once in the air kill them when they are once in the air passages. The best that can be done is to build up the system and strengthen the langs by the use of cod liver oil, good food, and fresh air. 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

Do what is necessary before the plant gets much of a start. Bring up your Fuchsias from the cellar and repot them, cutting the old branches back at least half, if that was not done when you put them away in the fall. Give Dack at least half, if that was not done when you put them away in the fall. Give plenty of water, a good light, and a rich, well-drained soil. They will soon break freely all over the old wood, and by March they will be covered with new shoots and heatthy foliage. Those who persist in keeping their Fuchsias in the living-room all winter know very little of what this plant is capable of doing if given a complete rest for three or four months. After such a rest it will make an astonishing growth in a short time, and be loaded down with fowers, a good share of the summer and fall; but if kept in the light and heat all winter it will grow tall and spindling, and be weak, and give but few blossoms. --Eben & K. The bottle is then thoroughly cleaned and placed neck downward in a convenient support, as, for instance, through a hole borrd in a shelf, or it may be allowed to stand in a wide-mouthed bottle, resting by its shoulders on the rim of the mouth. A small hand-ingl of cottom woolls now thoreacting the mouth and was left in the preacher's now mouthed bottle, resting by its aboulders on the rim of the mouth. A small handful of cotton wool is now thoroughly wetted by squeezing it in water, and shreds of it are dropped into the bottle until a layer about two inches deep has been made. The shreds should be dropped in carefully,

about two inches deep has been made. The shreds should be dropped in carefully, so as to distribute them evenly, and not to let them pile up in the middle or at the sides. When enough cotton has been dropped in, a cup or two of water is pourd in, and the bottle gently tapped. This consolidates the mass and finishes the mat-ing of the filter-bed. The amount of alum needed to coagulate the water sufficiently for filtering need not, as a rule, exceed two grains to the gallor, and in many instances may be less, but in certain cases of very dirty waters, such as that of the Mississippi River, the amount of alum may be increased to four or even six grains per gallon. 
