In the adjoining lecture-room is his professor's desk, on one side of which is his full-length portrait, on the other that of Melancthon. These portraits are remarkably fine; and the fidelity of Luther's is attested also by a cast of his head, taken after his death, and hanging up in one of these apartments.
