

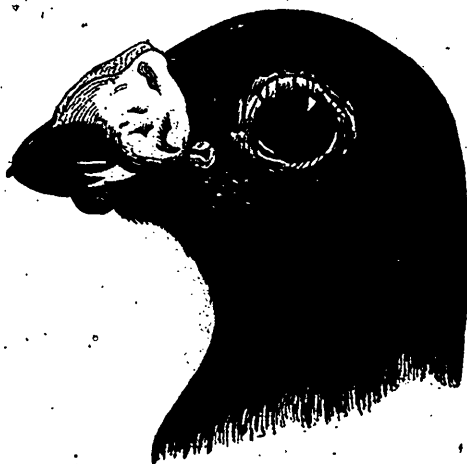

should be large and bright red, the eye cere white and thin evenly distributed all around the eye and being close to the cheeks; the cheeks should be full. The beak wattle should be smooth, fine in texture and powdery white, it should fill up the curve of the beak and head and a trifle more, large beak wattles are disliked by the most accurate judges. The skull viewed from the front should be as wide as possible. The neck should be long and not too thin; the carriage sprightly, wing butts projecting, wings and tail moderately long, breast full, legs and feet stout and strong, thighs not too long, colors Red Chequers, Blue Chequers, Blues and Silver Duns are the standard colors.
