TORONTO MARKETS.

Liverpool has fallen 2 1/2 on red wheat and 1 1/2 per cent on white and 1/2 on pens since our last report. New York is also easier and 1/2 lower, nominally for wheat. Western markets easier and 1/2 to 3/4 lower. Montreal lower, but without material change, there is no prospect of sell here today, and notwithstanding the lightness of stocks prices were easier. There were no sales reported in the wheat and the market may be regarded as without material change in the absence of transactions, although we would not be surprised to see it rise up to close of (Change the only sale heard of was that of 100 barrels of No. 1 super at \$5 95 f.o.c. Oats also were more active, and a few cars changed hands but not to the extent of wheat. Barley remains purely nominal, nothing doing. Pens—quiet and unchanged.

Flour—There was a large supply at market, prices ranged from \$18 to \$24 50 for Timothy.

Straw—Small supply at \$10 per ton for loose, and \$14 bundled.

Wool—Arrivals have almost ceased, but for all offering the market is firm at 52c, and for very choice 53c has been bid.

Hides—Supply small at 15c to 17c per doz.

Butter—The market is still but sparingly supplied. 1 lb. rolls to-day were worth less money and sold at 18c to 22c per lb. Tub is quotable at 15c to 16c, and store packed at 11c to 18c.—Leader.
