



## The Motor Truck that Saved Brantford \$127,000 in Seven Months' Use

For four years previous to 1916, Brantford's average fire loss was \$134,000 annually. Last year this was reduced to \$17,150. Chief Lewis in his report to the Council, gives the Waterous Motor Truck most of the credit for this big saving. He says:

"The new combination hose and chemical truck, which was purchased from the Waterous Engine Works Company, has proved itself serviceable in all kinds of weather.

"Since being in service the truck has travelled about 275 miles. The cost for gasoline amounted to \$27.08 for the period of seven months. This is somewhat lower than the average cost of keeping a team of horses for one month."
