## LABOUR DISPUTES

WABCO LTD.—IMPORTATION OF PARTS DURING STRIKE— MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

That the government review all of the terms and conditions currently in existence which permit WABCO Ltd. to import into Canada air brakes from their U.S. operations during the prolonged labour dispute which has resulted in a strike and, furthermore, that action be taken to protect Canadian workers who are exercising their legal right from having their position undermined by subsidiaries of U.S. companies, such as WABCO, which, while refusing to bargain in good faith, replace their Canadian-made products with a product manufactured by them in plants outside this country.
