COPYRIGHT ACT

MEASURE TO AMEND

The House resumed consideration of the motion of Miss MacDonald that Bill C-60, an Act to amend the Copyright Act and to amend other Acts in consequence thereof, be read the second time and referred to a legislative committee.

Mrs. Sheila Finestone (Mount Royal): Mr. Speaker, I note that Bill C-54 does not purport to extend copyright protection to actual semiconductor chips. This is surprising since the Bill does deal with other aspects of computer programs and software. The Ministry of Consumer and Corporate Affairs advises me that such changes will be forthcoming in part two of the copyright legislation yet to be tabled.
