GOVERNMENT ADVERTISING

REQUEST FOR PUBLIC INQUIRY INTO METHOD OF AWARDING CONTRACTS

Mr. Jacques Guilbault (Saint-Jacques): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Prime Minister and concerns the contracts for Government advertising that were mentioned in a number of reports today.

It is reported that Mr. Jean Péloquin, in his capacity as Cochairman of the Government's Advertising Management Group, awarded advertising contracts to his own company, Les productions Indigo, for a total of \$300,000, in addition to giving reference mostly to a number of businesses and advertising agencies that support the Conservative Party.

What I want to ask the Prime Minister is: Will he make the right decision this time and ask for a public inquiry into the way this Government awards advertising contracts?

Hon. Monique Vézina (Minister of Supply and Services): Mr. Speaker, I can assure the Hon. Member that as soon as the allegations were made, as the Minister responsible for Supply and Services I asked my department to investigate.

REQUEST THAT PUBLIC INQUIRY BE CONDUCTED

Mr. Jacques Guilbault (Saint-Jacques): Mr. Speaker, the Minister's reply is not exactly a surprise. By noon we knew she had asked for an internal investigation.

However, what we want is not a cover-up, not Jean Péloquin investigating Jean Péloquin, but a public inquiry. Not what happened in the Bissonnette case. In fact, 61 per cent of the population thinks the Government should have asked for a public inquiry.

Will the Government do what has to be done, not sweep the dust under the rug but hold a public inquiry?

Hon. Monique Vézina (Minister of Supply and Services): Mr. Speaker, the Advertising Management Group is a group that has done excellent work.

We have established a competition system. We are dismantling a patronage system. We have reduced advertising expenditures. We have rationalized this activity sector in the Government, and above all, we cut the propaganda program that was in place during the last 10 years of the previous Government.
