The Weather.

THE STATE AND COAL.

Government Ownership of Coal Mines Discussed by U. N. B. Students.

One of the most successful debates at college for sometime was that held Saturday evening between the seniors and juniors. The seniors, with Freese as leader, attempted to establish the following:

Resolved that the government ownership of coal mines would be for the benefit of the Dominion. Much interest was taken in the subject and many of that class went up who do not generally attend more than two or three debates during the entire year.

The juniors had chosen the negative with McLatchey for leader. The others that spoke were Grimmer, Hilliard, Jordan, Lynch, Massie, Murphy, Pugsley, Richards, Trueman, Weddall and McAdam.

Dr. Harrison was selected chairman and giving his decision gave a review of the principles which he thought should be used in determining the giving of a decision on a question of this nature, and, though the disastrous results of the struggle between capital and labor in other countries might induce him to think differently if the resolution had had a general application, yet since it was confined to Canada, he concluded that the seniors had not proved their resolution and gave the decision to the negative.

THE SCOTT ACT.

John McCoy of this City Convicted of a Third Offence.

A Legal Point Raised by His Counsel Will be Appealed.

Penalty Two Months' Imprisonment—A Stay of Proceedings.

Judge Marsh this morning delivered judgment in the Scott Act case against John McCoy, finding the defendant guilty of a third offence and imposing a penalty of two months imprisonment in the county jail. Mr. McLellan, counsel for Mr. McCoy, gave notice of appeal and a stay of proceedings will be obtained.

In delivering judgment His Honor stated that he would like to have the point raised by the counsel for the defendant decided by a higher court. His interpretation of the statute was in its strict sense that a third offence had been committed, but there was doubt in his mind as to whether or not the intention of the legislature was not in accord with the point raised by Mr. McLellan.

On August second last an information was laid by Rev. W. H. Robinson against John McCoy for a violation of the Scott Act, a second offence being charged. The offence was proven, it being committed on July 11th. In October a complaint was laid by Rev. J. J. Colter charging Mr. McCoy with a third offence against the Scott Act, the offence having been committed on July 12th. The sale of liquor was proven; but the counsel for Mr. McCoy contended that the sale for a third offence should be made subsequent to the laying of the information for a second offence. The case will be argued at the next sitting of the Supreme Court, and as previously stated, there will be a stay of proceedings.
