Nothing could be more striking than the industrial and agricultural effort put forth by the English people despite the withdrawal of several millions of men for service in the army, in the navy, and in the air force. It is surely a miracle that England is raising almost enough food for herself. English plants are clothing the British, French, Italian, Grecian, Siberian and other Allied armies. These armies have been largely equipped with English guns, and rifles, and shells, and aeroplanes. Even the growing American Army has been uniformed and equipped from English mills.

Nearly 2,000,000 English women are engaged in direct war work. I saw 50,000 of them employed in night and day shifts in a single munition plant near London. Nothing comparable to the efficient war contribution
