Bradstreet's Trade Review.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say general business conditions there continue satisfactory. The movement of general merchandise continues heavy. Retail trade in furs has been active. While the trade in furs has been better than it was earlier in the season, it has still not yet caught up with that of some previous seasons. Christmas goods are moving out well in all directions, and retail business in this connection is brisk. Wholesalers report sorting orders for staple lines as fair. Orders for sp ing drygoods are encouraging, but are not unusually large. Cottons and wools are generally firm. An excellent movement is reported in fancy lines. The hardware trade ho'ds up well. The demand for structural steel and general heavy itnes is reported good. All lines of groceries are moving well. Country trade has been rather more active during the week. Supplies of produce coming forward continue large, and prices generally fair. Those from the west show improvement over last week. Money is inclined to be firm, particularly when it is wanted for speculative purposes.

Toronto reports say all lines of trade there hold steady. Great activity is noted in holiday lines. The retail trade is opening out briskly, and early prophecies of a large turnover for the season would seem to have an excellent chance of being fuifilled. Even at this data large shipments are going to all parts of the country.
