It was learned that the solons of the game are inclined to believe that the balls are much too lively, and that a partial return to their former composition is necessary.

"I don't believe in rowdy'sm, but legiti-mate kicking is all right," said a promi-nent baseball man at the park the other

day.

"What do you mean by legitimate kicking?" asked another follower.

"Why, a protest against a palpably unfair decision," was the reply. "You can't blame an honest ball player for losing the worst of the breaks. If he protests against bad decisions without using abusive language he is strictly within his rights."

"That's where you show your ignorance of the rules," retorted the other man, who pulled out a rule book and said: "Rule 65 read: 'Under no circumstances shail a captain or player dispute the accuracy of the umpire's judgment and decisions on a play.' An umpire cannot reverse his decision unless it involves an interpretation of the rules, so all this kicking is of no avail. If there were no umpires baseball would be impossible. That is why they should be respected. Players have no right to kick over balls and strikes, fair or foul balls, or base decisions, and whenever they do they should be severely dealt with." be severely dealt with."


