THE FAMOUS NATIONAL DRINK

There's a story behind "Salvador" beer—Canada's most famous brew—that carries us back to the year 1651

The Grand Duke Ferdinand, the Bavarian monarch of that period, established the now famous cloister brewery on the Nockenberg Mountain, near Munich, and appointed Father Sale the chief brewmaster.
