WAITING ROOMS AT RONCES-VALLES.

Residents of the York Lake district who have been accustomed to weather the cold blast from Lake Ontario at the corner of Roncesvalles-ave. and King-st., will be delighted to learn that the Toronto Street Railway reservation obtained a permit to erect a waiting room at this corner. One resident of the district advocated last night that owing to the long waits at this corner, the street railway should install a lunch counter and sleeping accommodation in the new structure.

Fire Scare at House of Providence.

A fire in the boiler room at the House of Providence in Power-st., gave the inmates of that place a scare at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. It was caused by the bursting of a tube in the boiler. A small explosion followed, blowing out the furnace doors and starting a small fire. A still alarm was turned in and the blaze was soon extinguished.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 10.—Twenty-two below and no relief in sight was the word given out from the weather bureau to-day.

At Minneapolis the cold was intense, the thermometer recording 22 degrees below.

A further charge is brought that the sanitary conditions are very bad. A member of the union said last evening: "I have worked for Fulman & Son for quite a length of time and have always had trouble with them. We are not striking for a closed shop, but merely want the firm to pay the standard rates of wages paid by all the other shops of Toronto. We also want the sanitary conditions remedied, as at the present time the work-rooms are in a very bad condition. All we want is fair play and that every employee be given a fair chance whether he is union or non-union."

Negotiations for a settlement of the strike up to the present time have not been very successful, but every hope is held out for an amicable agreement.

The outlook for the settlement is very optimistic view of the situation at the present time and state that they have about forty non-union men and women at work.

APPOINT HARBOR OFFICIALS.

Ex-Controller F. S. Spence stated yesterday that the first work of the harbor commission would be to appoint the engineering and business officials to look after the improvement and administer the harbor property. One of the chief duties of these officials, he said would be to deal with and encourage industries to locate on the property under the control of the commission.

Mr. Spence thought that the commission should have sufficient information since deep water docks, connection with three transcontinental railways, cheap land and electrical energy at cost were all available in the Ashbridge's Bay property.

Dr. Naamith, city bacteriologist, stated yesterday that the city's water before chlorination had shown a steady improvement in quality. He believed that the results of the city's analysis made the outlook very favorable to the time when the city would be receiving water with 98 per cent of the impurities eliminated.
