STREET CAR STRIKE LOOMS IN LONDON

Men May Leave Work on July Second—Awards in Halifax. London, June 26.—Failure on the part of the street railway company to grant its employees an increase in pay within the next few days may mean a strike of the men and a tie-up of the system on Wednesday, July 2, according to a statement given to the press by the men's committee today.

Awards in Halifax. Halifax, June 26.—The board of arbitration which has been at work for a week on the wage scale for men in the building trades in Halifax, brought in its award yesterday. Their findings are unanimous and the average increase is about 24 per cent, compared with the wages paid before the strike began and about eight per cent over what the employers offered, following the demand by the unions. Carpenters and painters are allowed sixty-six cents an hour, whereas the old rate was 50 and 55 cents, respectively. They had asked for seventy-five cents. Plasterers and stone masons, who had been receiving fifty-five and 60 cents an hour, are given 75. Electricians and plumbers are given 70 cents.

Settle in Kingston. Kingston, Ont., June 26.—It is believed that settlement of strike of 850 metal workers at the locomotive works is in sight. The company has made an offer of an increase in wages of five per cent and a forty-five hour week.

Over at Three Rivers. Quebec, June 26.—The strike of twelve hundred hands at the Three Rivers Shipyard, Ltd., Three Rivers, came to an end this morning when the firm recognized exclusively the international union and signed a one-year contract with that union, renewable from year to year at the option of the union. All hands resumed work this morning.

LARGE MAJORITY CHOOSES DEWART AS THEIR LEADER

Tilter at License Boards Beats Tolmie by Thirty-Seven Votes. PROUDFOOT WITHDREW No Use Late Union Adherent Seeking Liberal Vote, He Claims.

Exactly at 3:15 p.m. yesterday H. Hartley Dewart, K.C., was elected permanent leader of the Liberal party in Ontario and in the legislature. His choice to the premier position in the party was a popular one, and the announcement of his success in the ballot was received with loud cheering.

Two ballots were necessary before Mr. Dewart secured his victory. In the first ballot, five names were put before the delegates for election. On the votes being counted the result was found to be: H. H. Dewart, 147; S. P. Tolmie, 107; J. C. Elliott, 37; William Proudfoot, 23; T. McMillan, 23.

There were 213 delegates returned, and it required any candidate who would be duly elected to receive 137 votes. As the leading figures were below that number a second ballot became necessary.

Before this was taken Mr. Proudfoot announced he would withdraw from the ballot and withdraw anything he had put up for, but those who did not do that, the vote shows that anyone who has had anything to do with the Liberal party will not receive any support from a Liberal convention, or rather a so-called Liberal convention.

There were loud calls for a withdrawal of the last statement, but Mr. Proudfoot refused in none too good a mood. "I won't withdraw anything," he said. "After a small uproar had been calmed down Mr. McMillan announced his resignation from the ballot, thus leaving three candidates for the post."

On the second ballot being taken the result showed a clear victory for Mr. Dewart. There were 303 cards put up for him, and he required 152 to secure election. The exact figures were: H. H. Dewart, 158; S. P. Tolmie, 121; J. C. Elliott, 24.

In returning thanks for his election Mr. Dewart said that whilst there was a doubt as to when a general election would be held, he was sure that the party in power would choose the moment best suited to their purpose.

Proud of Platform. "I am glad," he continued, "we Liberals have a platform on which we can all stand. We will see that the statutes which are being passed and we will see to it that the Liberal party will occupy the place it should in the coming campaign. Rejected the coming campaign.
