

## HOOTING MOB OF STRIKERS FOLLOWS FUNERAL CORTEGE

Shower of Stones Falls From Roof  
Upon Heads of the Mourners.

New York, May 21.—The east side was aroused yesterday by three riots of striking drivers and sympathizers, who mobbed and stoned funerals. Weddings also were interfered with, and brides and guests had to walk or ride on street cars.

The worst disturbance of the day occurred at the funeral of Samuel Diamond, from his late residence in Avenue C. The undertaker had been able to get only one open coach and a hearse, and he drove the hearse himself. His son drove the carriage, which was occupied by the Diamond family. Three hundred friends of the Diamond family, finding no carriages, determined to walk. The procession started for the Williamsburg bridge, followed by a hooting crowd of strikers and their sympathizers.

At Norfolk and Delany streets a shower of stones fell from the roof of one of the tenements upon the heads of the mourners. Several missiles struck the carriage occupied by the relatives. No one was hurt. When the mourners recovered from their surprise they charged to the tenement roof in the hope of catching the culprits, but they were gone. The attack was so sudden that two policemen acting as escort were unable to make arrests. The police are searching for the stone throwers.

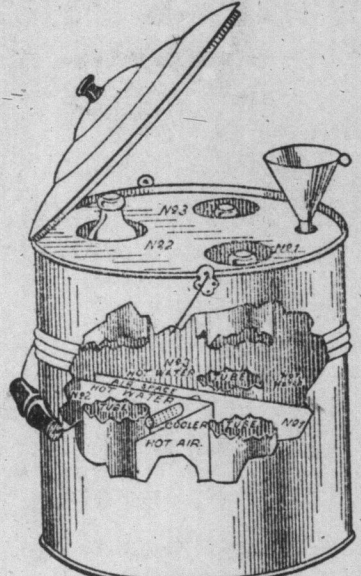
### Changing Places, Brown.

## OVER BALTIC IN AIRSHIP TRIP WITHOUT PARALLEL

Son of Don Carlos of Spain Proposes to Fly From London to Point in Austria.

London, May 21.—More remarkable than any feat of aerial navigation on record is the balloon trip to be made from London this week by Prince Jaime of Bourbon and Baron Josef Von Korwin, a lieutenant in the Austrian army. It now develops that the aeronauts will attempt to cross the Baltic Sea to some point in Austria, covering the distance of approximately 1000 miles.

The expedition will be without parallel, the nearest approach to it being the voyage made by Comte de la Vaulx from Paris to Kien, in Russia, during the Paris exposition. Baron Von Korwin explained that the balloon would be inflated with pure hydrogen, because it has double the carrying power of ordinary gas. "We are using hydrogen for the purpose of making greater headway," he said. "In spite of the fact that it is quite dangerous. We will carry enough provisions to last 48 hours, the belts and a quantity of grease. The trip is planned in the interest of the Austrian government."

Prince Jaime, the son and heir of Don Carlos, claimant of the Spanish throne, during the Russo-Japanese war, fought in the Russian army, being wounded at Liotang, subsequently being decorated for gallantry. Baron Von Korwin has made 1000 ascensions and 130 voyages during the last ten years. He is the head of the balloon department in the Austrian army.

### CREMATED IN COTTAGE.

C.R. Agent at Chatham Meets Death in Flames.

Chatham, May 21.—W. H. Harper, 57 years of age, city ticket and telegraph agent of the C.R. in this city, was burned to death this morning at his summer home at Erieau, the summer resort on Lake Erie, south of Blenheim. He went down on Saturday with three friends, Messrs. Arch Park, J. C. Park and C. C. Greening, who have cottages there, and who went down to inspect them.

They were awakened this morning by the blaze from the Harper cottage, which was entirely in flames. Mr. Harper's body was found in the ruins with the limbs burned to a crisp. It is thought that the fire started in the rear of the house from the stove or a lamp, and that Mr. Harper was suffocated by the smoke. Two cottages nearby were also burned.

### AFFRAY ON OIL KING'S ESTATE

One Italian Dead, While Two Others Are Seriously Wounded.

New York, May 21.—There was an affray last night between three Italians employed at Boxwood, the country estate of John D. Rockefeller, at Port Antonio Hills, and four Italians, said to be agents of a secret society, who have been trying to get the Rockefeller Italians to contribute funds. Seven shots were fired and John Contentino was killed by a bullet in his brain, while Tony Dominick and another were badly wounded. Dominick is expected to die.

The men who did most of the firing escaped and posses of foreigners are hunting for them in the woods.

### HOTEL FIRE AT THE FALLS

DAMAGE PLACED AT \$10,500

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 21.—A hot fire occurred at 4 o'clock this morning on Bridge-street, opposite the Grand Trunk station, completely gutting the Grand Central Hotel, a three-story frame structure; loss \$8000; also Ben Johnson's barber shop, a two-story frame building, next to it; loss \$4500.

The fire department had hard work to save the American and Crozier Hotels, both frame structures, on either side of the burning buildings.

### RIDOUT CASE OFF.

That trouble between Mr. Ridout and Policeman Phillips, which raised such a little pampus in the police court last Friday, has flattened out to the glory of the policeman. Mr. Ridout having appeared before the staff inspector on Saturday, stating that he had been entirely under a misapprehension, and was willing to make verbal amends to the officer. Staff Inspector Archibald says that the matter is now dropped.

### Canadians Exempt.

Ottawa, May 21.—It has been intimated to the Canadian government that steps will be taken by the United States to guard against Canadians being held up at the international boundary for the \$2 poll tax. Canadians were specially exempt from this tax when they have been required to pay it, because of the insistence of over-zealous American customs officers.

### Supreme Court Adjourns.

## FERRY CO. WANTS WARD'S? RUMORED AT CITY HALL

Negotiations Said to Be Pending—Mayor Goes to Ottawa—Many Municipal Matters.

With the fact that Wm. Ward has not yet signed his renewal lease for the island property, which there has been so much trouble about, comes a persistent rumor that negotiations are under way for the purchase by the Toronto Ferry Company of the interests held by Mr. Ward, who holds about three acres of city property, which would be in a fine position for development as a pleasure place.

There has long been talk of turning the Ward Point into a rival for Hamilton's at the west, and some leading theatrical men are said to have been behind the proposal, which was delayed while the squabbling was going on over the license for a big new hotel there. Mr. Ward's legal advisers said yesterday afternoon that they did not know of Mr. Ward being under negotiations with the Toronto Ferry Company. Assessment Commissioner Harris was also gone to Ottawa in connection with details regarding smoke consumers.

Mayor Coatsworth went down to Ottawa again last night to be in attendance before the railway committee today, when telephone legislation comes up. Property Commissioner Harris has also gone to Ottawa in connection with details regarding smoke consumers.

It is the intention of the mayor to press upon the aldermen right away the lake-front boulevard scheme, and he favors a street railway thru the old fort property, thus making the fort available to citizens who never see it now. Mayor Coatsworth had not much to say about the meeting of the Consumers' Gas Company, which he attended as a director yesterday. The company is still trying to find out if gas can be got cheaper than other fuel for heating purposes. Just as soon as the reaches an amount large enough to justify it, the mayor will move for cheaper illuminating gas.

After Exemptions. Assessment Commissioner Forman has been asked by the mayor to prepare a report in reference to the taxation exemptions of the city, some of which might be abolished.

Controller Shaw will be acting mayor for the Sherrington reception to-day at the city hall. A number of Hamilton aldermen are expected.

The railway commission has made an order allowing the G.T.R. to construct a siding into Grey's factory on the Eglinton line on the usual terms.

Another new batch of permits has been issued, representing a value in building operations of \$200,000, all for dwellings.

To Set Aside Tax Sales. An action has been entered against the city by Hamilton Cassels to have the tax sale of 1902 declared invalid in regard to nineteen lots which the city bought in. The properties are on Vermont-street, Bathurst-street and Palmerston-avenue, and the deeds were made out to the mayor and city treasurer.

Not So. There was some rumor around the hall to the effect that Controller S. Alfred Jones is a candidate for the new office of commissioner of industries. He unequivocally denies that there is any truth in it.

The island committee meeting called for yesterday afternoon was canceled, the secretary discovering that it would be impossible to get a quorum.

People wanting the property commissioner at the city hall will not find him in his old office. He has removed to the southwest corner of the hall, where there will be more room for him and the city architect.

Needn't Boil Water. Dr. Sheard doesn't think the boiling of water needs to be considered so necessary now, as the water has quieted down. Some localities in the city are better than others, as the waterworks is flushing pipes in some places.

Another request has been made to the board of control to again take up the matter of a rag-pickers' warehouse, as the fraternity are not satisfied at present.

There is a protest regarding the assistance to natural beauty of an artist's sign on Riverside Park refreshment booth, and the park commissioner is attending to it.

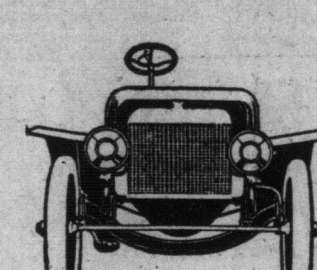
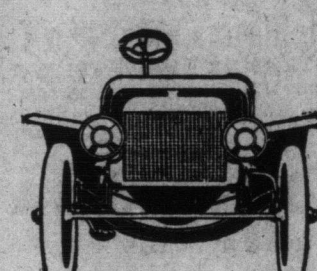
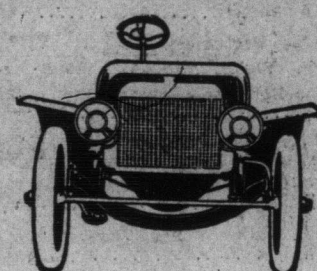
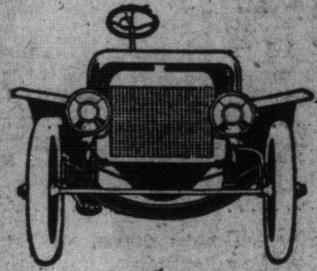

### ATTACKED BY MOORS.

American Ship Forced to Hand Over Some of Her Passengers.

Mejilla, Morocco, May 21.—The steamer Menolita, bound from Tetuan, Morocco, for this port, and flying the American flag, has been attacked by Moors, who took away some of her passengers. The Menolita's machinery got out of order and she was obliged to approach the coast. While lying off Penon De Velez, about half way between Tetuan and Mejilla, a number of Moorish fishermen swam off from the shore and boarded the steamer, compelling her crew to hand over to them a number of Moorish passengers, belonging to the Beni Barrague tribe.
