Well-known Hamilton Crooks—Part of the ill-gotten money recovered—Tall Tale of a British North America Bill—Mrs. Cawley, New Improving—A Pick-pocket Nabbed.

Hamilton, Feb. 16.—(Special).—The police have in custody the two men who beyond a doubt, robbed and robbed John Cawley, Mayor, Treasurer, and Cashier, on Friday afternoon. On Friday night the detectives were told that the men seen running away, and they immediately set out to capture them. On Saturday morning Detective and Blackie saw Tompkins standing on the corner of York and Locke streets. Tompkins had only a small sum of money on him, and there was nothing about him that would indicate that he was the man wanted. The detectives and policemen, in plain clothes, continued their search for the man. Tompkins could not be seen about his customary haunts on Friday night or Saturday. About 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon Detective Blackie had a warrant sworn out to search the house of Mrs. Mary Cawley, who had served as Barton, for the money stolen, and was accompanied by Detectives Reid and Campbell and two constables. When they found Horn and Lyon sleeping in the bed, they called to them. The significance of this was that the man was Tompkins' sister, Detective Reid took Horn away and the other officers found \$400 in a drawer. Of this \$400 was in \$5 Bank of British North America bills and the balance in \$2 and \$1 bills. The authorities are still searching for the rest of the money. Horn has been in the Police Court several times, and Tompkins has served a term in Central Prison for assault. They have both been receiving undue attention from the police for years. Cawley, the victim of the assault, is well last night and if complications don't set in, Dr. Stark and Philip have hopes of his recovery.

A Pick-pocket Nabbed. Jos. Cook, a young man who was committed for trial about a year ago for picking a woman's pocket in St. Patrick's Church, but was acquitted at the higher court, was arrested by P.C. Tuck on Saturday morning on charges of pocket-picking. As he was going through the market, Mrs. Mahoney pointed him out as the man who had tempted to steal her purse in Gore Street Church last Monday evening. When other officers took him, however, he made no resistance. Cook has been watched by the detectives for some time.

A Young Life Cut Off. Miss Nixon, a young daughter of a respectable Nixon, James street north, died suddenly last night. She did not feel well yesterday morning, but she did not think her illness was serious enough to call a physician.
