To the surprise of the officers they found Horn and Lyons is Tompkins' sister. Detective Reid took Horn away, and the other officers found \$460 in a drawer. Of this, \$215 was in \$5 Bank of British North America bills, and the balance in \$2 and \$1 bills. The authorities are still searching for the rest of the money. Horn has been in the Police Court several times, and Tompkins has served a term in Central Prison for assault. They have both been receiving undue attention from the police for years. Cauley, the victim of the assault, is scmewhat better to-night. He rested well last night and if complications don't set in, Drs. Stark and Philp have hopes of his recovery.
