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EXTENSIVE AREA OF PARK.

With respect to the reservation of land for park purposes on the Island about four hundred acres of land, marsh and water now constitute what is technically known as Island Park. This area, which comprises all the bay front from the R. C. Y. Club property west to Blockhouse Bay, including the long pond; a large area on the lake front east and south of the lighthouse; and the entire western sand bar, running north to the Queen's wharf channel, appears to be sufficient for the requirements of the people.
